
A ROTARY MINUTE

The year is 1914 and Rotarians around the country are headed to the 5th Rotary International convention in Houston, TX.

A group of west coast Rotarians chartered a train to take them to the convention (No, this is not a picture of the actual train).




One of the passengers and the only woman was, Ann Brunier, the wife of the club president of San Francisco, Henry Brunier.



point of calling each other by their first names without the baggage of titles, sweet and charming Mrs. Brunier quickly became Ann and almost as quickly became "our Rotary Ann". During the ride a number of songs and stunts were

organized which would be performed in Houston including a "Rotary Ann" chant. Upon disembarking

they lifted her into the air and began singing their chant.



A reception group met the train in Houston and among the group was a Philadelphia Rotarian, Guy Gundaker and his wife, who was also named Ann. When her name was discovered, she too was hoisted onto their shoulders and paraded through the station while they chanted:

"Our Ro-tary Ann, Ro-tary Ann!" Immediately the same term of endearment was used for all of the wives in attendance and the name "Rotary Ann" was here to stay.

President-elect Monica Fraga was absent, so President Vicki


had the honor of picking the winner this week, and, once again, **Miles Bell** was selected. Miles chose the certificate to Fiore's.
