SPEAKING UP FOR YOUTH ONE CHILD AT A TIME





District 5160 Foundation Day





Program Chair Miles Bell introduced today's speaker, Ann Wrixon, who is the Executive Director of the Court Appointed Special Advocates

(CASA) There are over one

(CASA). There are over one thousand abused or neglected youth that come under the Contra Costa County care system because they are no longer able to safely live at home.

Can you imagine being taken away from your parents, your friends and

life as you know it, not because of anything you did, but because they cannot, or will not take care of you or protect you? Then dozens of strangers enter your life: police, foster parents, social workers, judges, and lawyers. This is a common scenario that abused and neglected children and youth face when they enter foster care, and that is where Ann Wrixon comes in. Through the CASA, Ann is the advocate who steps in

to speak for the youths' best interest. Ann, who serves on the CASA Board, provided additional information about this wonderful organization.

CASA provides volunteer advocacy services to children who are dependents of the Juvenile Courts. The CASA volunteers are appointed by the Juvenile Court and work one-on-one with these children, fostering a unique atmosphere of trust and mutual respect leading to a meaningful relationship. CASA volunteers visit the foster home, meet with teachers, mental health providers, attorneys, and social workers so they can provide a complete and detailed report to the Juvenile Court about a child's situation and make recommendations for improvement. Ann Wrixon's interest in evidence-based research on child welfare, and ways to help children heal from abuse and neglect led her to devote her life's work to providing advocacy service to foster youth in the court system. Ann is the Executive Director of CASA and is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker (LCSW) in California. She earned her Masters of Social Work from California State University East Bay, a Master's of Business Administration from San Francisco State University, and a Bachelor of Arts in English Literature from Rutgers University. Ann has always enjoyed reading research reports, and her blog contains short summaries of the research she read about child welfare with links to the full articles. She has co-authored two books herself: Another Choice and True Stories of Open Adoption.
