




Since 2009 New Day has worked to restore the lives of American girls aged 10 and older who have been rescued from sex trafficking. Their goal is to

create children of character, provide direction for them to pursue their hopes and dreams, and free them from the nightmares of their past. Working with the FBI, law enforcement, parents, and local service agencies, New Day's programs are designed to lift the girls out of their desperate circumstances. Over the past three years Sharon Wood has

Finally, little Alex's voice, barely audible and trembling with fear asked, "Which service, the 8:00 or the 10:30?"






