INSPIRING WOMEN MAKING A DIFFERENCE

International Women's Day has a rich history dating back 108 years the first glimpse of it was in 1909 when 15,000 women from the Socialist Party of America protested long work hours, low pay, and the lack of voting rights in New York City. Today International Women's Day is celebrated on the 8th of March every year around the world and is a focal point in the movement for women's rights. The United Nations began celebrating the day in 1977. In fact, Rotary International embraced this day and for clubs around the world, March 8, is a day worth remembering if only to celebrate the admission of women into Rotary in 1987.

The following members have served in many capacities in our Club and all have an impressive collection of skills and accomplishments:

EWA SOBILO was the first female member of our Club when she joined



in 1993. In 2003 she resigned to raise her children. During her tenure at the Club, she became the Group Study Exchange team leader for Japan, a member of the Paul Harris Society, and member of the Concord Ambassadors Sister City Organization. As a child, Ewa lived in Gdansk, Poland, the home town of the Polish Solidarity movement. Together, with her twin brother and parents, they lived in Mumbai, India and then moved to the United States. After graduation from the University of Illinois she worked for the Toyota Motor Company in Japan. Ewa and her husband are owners of the Moose Metal Company that specializes in metal sales and fabrication. Fwa returned to our Club on July 26, 2018, is the Treasurer-elect for the 2020/2021 term and lives in Concord.

BARBARA REIFSCHNEIDER joined Rotary on February 1, 2001, and was instrumental in



becoming our Club's first female President for the 2009/2010 term. Barbara was **Rotarian of the year** in 2007 and is a Paul Harris Fellow. After a lengthy career with Pacific Bell, she retried and joined Trader Joes's where she has worked for the past 14 years. Barbara grew up in San Mateo, and she and her husband, Mark, have lived in their Concord home for the past 29 years.

VICKI SEXTON joined our club on August 5, 2017, after being a member of the Brentwood



Rotary Club for eight years where she served as their Treasurer. Vicki is a Paul Harris Fellow and is our President-elect for the 2020/2021 term. 

Check out Vicki Sexton and her PETS personal poster. Vicki tells us that her poster was the


