"WILL THIS ZOOM MEETING COME TO ORDER"



Fortunately, we're both avid readers, and even with the libraries closed, we have enough books in the house to last for a 150-year shutdown."

Jeff Rondini writes: "Death and taxes—the two certainties of life! We are proceeding as normal at my tax office. Unlike HRB's directive, the state has placed tax offices under "essential businesses" and is permitted to remain open. Let's face it, if I didn't stay open now, I'd be on unemployment or worse in the fall. Relying on our government for financial survival is ludicrous. Clients continue to come in, while others inquire about providing documents remotely via website uploads, emails and Apps like Dropbox. People are paying remotely through Venmo and Zelle rather than writing checks. It's a relief the IRS and the California Franchise Tax Board has extended the filing deadline three months. It gives us enough time to catch-up on the backlog of tax returns we already have. Hope you're all doing well. Stay safe and remain healthy. We'll do the same."

Ewa Sobilo wants us to know that: "Moose Metal is still open for business Mon-Fri 8a-5p. We are a metals supplier to the essential businesses such as Contra Cost Water District and Contra Costa County Fire Department. We sell steel, aluminum and stainless. We specialize in custom fabrication and can help with your needs to complete projects or do welding repairs. Great time to do home projects that are on your to-do list, but you've not had time to get around to. We don't deliver so you would have to pick up materials at our shop, just a couple of blocks behind Costco in Concord. I can also connect you with a delivery service located in our industrial park."

Judith Stillman said: "Thank you for sending this out. If you remember I spoke at your meeting a few weeks ago about the Winter Nights Family Shelter. I want you all to know that the car we donated to one of their homeless families a few months ago are very happy and thankful. We have been very busy planning on how to have our homeless families' shelter-in-place and how to allow our army of volunteer to do the same. So, we are not allowing any volunteers (usually 100 to 150 a week) from coming to the shelter. Many are still providing breakfast, lunch and snack foods for the families, but we are having food from restaurants and caterers brought in for dinners. The County's Shelter-in-Place order this week impacts Winter Nights enormously. Families cannot leave the shelter and volunteers cannot enter. We have twelve weeks left in the season, and our commitment to our families is unwavering."



Renee Rushworth writes: "Thank you for putting together this informative newsletter. I have heard stories of the polio epidemic and my late step-mother, Pam (Johnny Morgan's mom), was a polio survivor. I believe she even became a poster child for the vaccine. Johnny can probably tell you more about that. It was a scary time. Our newsletter is an eye-opener to the similarities of the epidemic we fought and won not too long ago. It also gives me reassurance that we can pull through this, just as we did before."

"As for the Coronavirus, my family and I are all hunkered down in our home. My daughter is performing school lessons daily that she finds on the internet to my two granddaughters who are in Pre-K and 1st grade. Work for the rest of the family is scarce due to business closures or furloughs. Most of my work is remote so, luckily, I am not too affected. Our plans to sell our home have been put on hold temporarily. I'm hoping that once the Shelter-in-Place is lifted, we can resume our plans to move to Arizona."

Torsten Jacobsen writes: "We turned our house over to some of our kids and grandkids for logistical reasons and took off for time on the beach of the sea of Cortez. A bunch of corona viruses were high-tailing us, but we out ran them on the way down here, and they also realized that it was not to their liking; virtually no people, sunshine, and warm weather. Not a place for gatherings, no real old people's senior centers for easy targets; they would have to fly an enormous distance over the sea or in from the deserted desert, and no poor air quality with high particulate matter. So, 99.9% of the little opportunistic cowardly bastards turned around. We plan to return pre-mortem in a vertical position, unless Odin sends me off to do battle."

Chris Ruzicka writes: "As with everyone else, the last week has been stressful. We have reduced our
