

THE WORLD IS WATCHING

Governor Tina Akins said: "Yes, the world is watching, and we, as Rotarians, people of action, are now truly defined by our actions in this crisis." I am making an extraordinary request of you, and all members in our district, to join the fight against COVID-9. It's called Volunteer Surge. Our district is one of two leading in the Volunteer Surge program and your immediate participation is critical to its success. Two weeks ago, Rotarians in a local club engaged Rotary International to recruit 1 million volunteers in two weeks to sign up with Volunteer Surge, a new program that allows us to train online, for free, to become a Telehealth Worker, or a Community Health Worker. These volunteers will provide basic assistance, and will reduce suffering and save lives, locally and across the nation. How? By helping our health care providers to focus more of their attention where it is most needed.



FRONTLINE DEFENDERS



The world is fighting a powerful enemy: COVID-19. Our frontline medical defenders are not soldiers; they are health workers. They have no guns or war tanks or military planes or military boats. They have themselves, their selflessness, their generosity, their technical knowledge, their dedication, and commitment. They put their lives at risk every minute of the day. Why? Why do they do this? We put this question to **Torsten Jacobsen** and this is his response:

"What drives health care workers, i.e., nurses and doctors of medicine to do what they do regardless of personal risk factors? There are certain occupations that require dedication to the point of putting

oneself at risk to meet the obligations. Think of the firefighter who enters a burning building to rescue someone or the marine who is sworn to risk his own life to save his wounded, endangered buddy and does so without hesitation because he could not live with himself if he did not at least try. Nurses and doctors know what is driving them when they start training and if that is not strong, they will drop out or side track into a safe and less meaningful branch and most totally underestimate the stresses from multiple sources that they will be subjected too including the length and intensity of training.

Many specialties require as much as 13 years of higher education—orthopedic surgery for example. When I have been called upon at times, such as the disastrous earthquake in Haiti, with hundreds of thousands injured and no facilities left, the thought of not going never entered my mind, and no credit would be appropriate or sought. The Hippocratic Oath states among other things: "I will apply for the benefit of the sick all measures that are required.' It also states, which is all the more pertinent today, that: 'I will protect the environment which sustains us, in the knowledge that the continued health of ourselves and our society is dependent on a healthy planet.'"

TODAY'S SPEAKERS

Three guests from the Brentwood Rotary Club, **Bob Rogers**, **Mike** and **Marcia Crosby**, joined us this morning, via Zoom. They showed us a video and spoke to us about the work they are doing in India to eradicate Polio, and how the COVID-19 is directly affecting the work they are doing. They traveled to India and vaccinated a lot of the children. They pointed out how Polio was a frightful virus that swept the globe many years ago and was conquered with the creation of a vaccine with much help from the Rotary clubs all over the world and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. We are in the same situation today due to COVOID-19. This is truly **Service above Self** and we thank them for their efforts .
