SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT



Bill Selb was moved by an item he read and wanted to share it with us. It is titled: **We Are Not in the Same Boat**:

I heard that we are all in the same boat, but it's not like that. We are in the same storm, but not in the same boat. Your ship could be shipwrecked and mine might not be, or vice versa.

For some, quarantine is optimal; a moment of reflection, of re-connection, easy in flip flops, with a cocktail or coffee. For others, this is a desperate financial & family crisis.

For some that live alone, they're facing endless loneliness. While for others it is peace, rest & time with their mother, father, sons & daughters.

With the \$600 weekly increase in unemployment, some are bringing in more money to their households than when they were working. Others are working more hours for less money due to pay cuts or losses in sales.

Some families of four just received \$3400 from the stimulus while other families of four saw \$0. Some were concerned about getting a certain candy for Easter while others were concerned if there would be enough food to get them through the weekend.

Some want to go back to work because they don't qualify for unemployment and are running out of money.

Others despise those who break the quarantine. Some are home spending 2-3 hours/day helping their child with online schooling while others are spending 2-3 hours/day to educate their children on top of a 10-12 hour workday.

Some have experienced the near death of the virus, some have already lost someone from it and some are not sure if their loved ones are going to make it. Others don't believe this is a big deal. Some have faith in God and expect miracles during this 2020. Others say the worst is yet to come.

So, friends, we are not in the same boat. We are going through a time when our perceptions and needs are completely different. Each of us will emerge, in our own way, from this storm. It is very important to see beyond what is seen at first glance. Not just looking, actually seeing. We are all on different ships during this storm experiencing a very different journey.—Author unknown.

What is doubly special about the Honorable Mention winner is that he just happens to be the student that **Fred** and **Lois Nelson** are supporting through the current scholarship program.









Even better is that his clients are slowly coming back and he has more work once again. It is still slow-going he said, but it is improving.

LARRY HUTCHINGS complemented the art work in last week's newsletter and the talents of the student. It brought back the memory of the scholarship project in 2002 that dealt with very

poor hearing-impaired children in Cartagena de India, Columbia. He told us how in 2000 he was on a cruise, and when it docked one day, he decided to skip the city tour and visited the Rehabilitation of Deaf Children Institute instead. Long story short: his involvement generated thousands of dollars in grants making it possible for approximately 30 students to complete their education through scholarships that included books, uniforms, audio equipment, and the opportunity to become integrated into society. Even though this was quite a long time ago, it was perfect that he recalled this project now as it fit perfectly with our Youth theme.





In July new students and families are introduced into the program at an orientation usually held at Rosita's Restaurant

They are made aware of the requirements to remain in the program These include:

Maintaining at least a "B" average Good attendance No drugs or alcohol Participation in community service Good citizenship Completion of all assignments Attend at least 6 Rotary Interact meetings The youth education program was named in honor of Gracie and Kuchy Sanchez

These two people proved to be instrumental in helping young people of San Felipe realize their dreams by providing food, clothing and any other assistance required to further their education. Many students were able to attend school because of the caring attributes of this Mother-daughter combination

The Rotary Club of San Felipe has taken the efforts of Gracie and Kuchy and expanded on the program. The Club believes that these women would be proud of what they started and what it has become today



The program begins each year by contacting existing and potentially new sponsors.

This provides funding for the program and the students

Once funding is secured
