In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Mother's Day an official holiday. It all started in 1908 with Anna Jarvis, who never married or had any children. She organized this observance to honor her own mother, who gave birth to 13 children, only four of whom lived to adulthood due to the Typhoid Fever that was ripping through her Appalachian community. The holiday Anna wanted to start was strikingly different from how we celebrate it today. Her idea was pretty much **Service Above Self** that she envisioned as informational sessions called 'Mothers' Day Work Clubs' intended to educate women about proper hygiene and give their children a better chance of staying healthy. Interesting to note that Typhoid Fever was their cross to bear at that time just as Covid-15 is ours.



Call **1-844-421-0804** from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. daily for an appointment at any Contra Costa site that includes Antioch, Concord, Walnut Creek, Martinez, Pittsburg, San Pablo and San Ramon. Testing is available by appointment only. All Contra Costa Health Services (CCHS) offer drive-through testing but you <u>must</u> make an appointment. TODAY'S SPEAKER

Grace/Kuchy Sanchez Youth Education Program

Rich Lueck introduced today's speaker who actually needed no introduction as she is our very special member, **Tina Sweeny**, from our sister club of San Felipe. Tina's presentation was about the **Grace/Kuchy Sanchez Youth Education Program**. She said this program is named in honor of two women, Gracie and her daughter Kuchy, who proved to be instrumental in helping young people of San Felipe, realize their dreams to further their education. It costs money in San Felipe to attend high school and most young people and their families cannot afford the tuition. The program begins each year by contacting existing and new sponsors to secure funding for the students. Once funding is secured, existing students and new students are notified of their acceptance and added to the program.

It all starts with orientation where students receive their new shoes, uniforms, back packs and assorted items. To remain in the program the students are required to: maintain at least a B average, have good attendances, do not use drugs or alcohol, engage in community services, practice good citizenship, complete all assignments, and attend at least six Rotary Interact meetings each year.

The program ends with graduation. But it doesn't have to.

The Grace/Kuchy Sanchez Youth Education Program not only assists students in high school but also assists a few selected students at the university level by paying for tuition and testing. The program encourages participation in the local Interact program and has students assist in Rotary fundraisers throughout the year.

Tina ended her presentation with these words: "This program would not be possible without the generous donations of people like you."

ABOUT TINA:



Tina Sweeney was originally from California but became a full-time resident of San Felipe in March 2012. She joined The San Felipe Rotary January 2013 and became the Scholarship Coordinator the following month. Interesting to note that Tina's background was not in education. In fact, she was a Schedule Coordinator and Dispatcher for the utility company of the Northern CA Power Agency. She and her husband, Mike, have three adult children.

"Yeah, maybe so, but you don't know what I have to put up with," the coach blustered. "Look."


He went out into the hall and grabbed a jock who was jogging down the hallway. "Run over to my office and see if I'm there," he ordered.
