Thanksgiving in the United States has been observed on differing dates. From the time of the Founding Fathers until the time of Lincoln, the date of observance varied from state to state. The final Thursday in November had become the customary date in most U.S. states by the beginning of the 19th century, coinciding with, and eventually superseding the holiday of Evacuation Day which commemorated the day the British exited the United States after the Revolutionary War.

Sarah Josepha Hale wrote letters to politicians for approximately 40 years advocating an official Thanksgiving holiday observance. Modern Thanksgiving was proclaimed for all states in 1863 by Abraham Lincoln. Because of the ongoing Civil War, however, a nationwide Thanksgiving celebration was not realized until Reconstruction was completed in the 1870s.

On October 31, 1939, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed a presidential proclamation changing the holiday to the next to last Thursday in November, for business reasons, but on December 26, 1941, he signed a joint resolution of Congress changing the national Thanksgiving Day to the fourth Thursday in November.

introduced us to today's speaker,
Danielle John, Community
Outreach Engagement Manager,
who spoke to us about the needs
of youth in foster care in the Youth

Homes Inc. program. Danielle is responsible for connecting the volunteers' time, talent, and energy with the needs of the youths in their foster care and of those who have aged out of the care system.

Youth Homes provides shelter, food, safety, and structure in four homes as part of their Short-term Residential Therapeutic Program in which children and youth, ages 12 to 17, have stability and safety.



They also provide a Transition Age Youth Program for under-resourced and vulnerable Transition Age Youth (TAY) consisting of 17 to 21 year olds who shift into independent living and must deal with the unexpected realities of becoming an adult. Poverty, homelessness, unemployment, substance abuse, incarceration, and hospitalization are all real risks for the individuals who qualify for TAY services.

In essence, the Youth Homes program can be the difference between crafting a life filled with meaning and purpose or falling through the cracks of society. If you would like to volunteer or donate to the program, contact Danielle at: danielle@yoouthhomes.org


CONTINUED BOX STATE THAT A PROPERTY OF THE PR
