

Cliff started writing and collecting short articles about Rotary and publishing them in the North Stockton Rotary Club's weekly bulletin so their members would have access to interesting facts about Rotary and inspirational messages. When Cliff became President of Rotary International 1992-93, he collected and published all the articles he wrote and turned them into two books "The ABCs of Rotary" and "As I Was Saying..." that are given to all new members throughout the world as they become Rotarians. The books have been translated in 20 languages and is updated periodically. They are guides intended for all Rotarians to follow and embrace the colorful history of their organization, its customs, traditions, and current status of its global programs. (Continued on page 3)

I am sad to share with you that our dear Cliff Dochterman passed away early Tuesday morning, November 23<sup>rd</sup>. He lived a long and wonderful life, giving so much to Rotary and the world. Those of you, who were privileged to know him, know how he touched us all with his humor and his leadership. Those of you who have only heard so many stories about him, I want you to know that they are all true – and so much more."

#### CLIFFORD L. DOCHTERMAN 1925 - 2021




Cliff Dochterman is best known for his volunteer work for Rotary International and has served in almost every Rotary assignment in the world -- from Berkeley Rotary club president, to District Governor, to Rotary International Director, RI Vice President, Trustee of The Rotary Foundation, and the world President of Rotary International 1992-93.

In fact, Cliff has served on more Rotary committees and talked to more Rotary Clubs than anyone in the world, so it's hard to believe that he was initially rejected from the Berkeley Rotary Club. At the time, he was a young University of California administrator and assistant to the UC President who finally gained acceptance into the Berkeley Rotary Club after a third nomination. Is it any

surprise that shortly after joining, he became the club's President, then went on to become the local District Governor, and member of various international committees.

He is the author of two books, "The ABC's of Rotary" and "As I was Saying"



which has been translated into twenty languages. When he was President of Rotary International, he selected the theme "Real Happiness Is Helping Others," traveled the world many times, and has been honored by heads of state of dozens of countries for spreading goodwill and world understanding. He was one of the pioneers of the PolioPlus program that has immunized billions of children around the world and raised millions of dollars for refugees during the Yugoslav Wars.

Cliff is the recipient of the George Washington Honor Medal of The Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge for his contributions to the American way of life. He has served as president of the Stockton Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the San Joaquin County Parks and Recreation Commission. He also has had a long association with the Boy Scouts of America, and received three of the Scouts' highest awards and honors: Silver Beaver, Silver Antelope and Distinguished Eagle. He received honorary degrees from many universities for his humanitarian work throughout the world, and is credited for helping Rotary International realize its potential as a global philanthropic and service organization.

#### SHARED THOUGHTS ABOUT OUR DEAR FRIEND CLIFF



**DG Kathy Suvia** sent this message: "My fellow Rotarians, by now you all know of the passing of RI Past President, Cliff Dochterman. I'd like to share with you my personal story about him.

As a newly elected DGND, I was encouraged to visit Cliff as a part of my learning. I was a bit intimidated; I had met him only once, but I had been inspired by his speeches many times. Would he even know who I was? But I called, and as soon as I said my name, he responded, "Hello, Kathy, how are you enjoying your journey to becoming District Governor? Why don't you come for lunch?" So, we set a date and made plans to meet. Then, I worried about what I might say to someone with his life experience. (I can hear a few of our PDG's chuckling now!)

Conversation seems easier with three people, so to bolster my confidence I asked **Tina Akins**, DGE at the time, to join us. We had lunch with Cliff on a lovely June afternoon in 2019. My concerns vanished within the first few minutes. Cliff was gracious and curious about what we were learning and what plans we had for the district. He shared some of his most memorable club visits as DG in the 1960's ...including riding a donkey into Weaverville! We talked nonstop for nearly three hours. It's a special memory that I will treasure forever."

# **TODAY'S SPEAKER**

IVV is dedicated to bringing sight and eye care to the underserved in the world.

**Program Chair Miles Bell** introduced us to today's speaker, **Dr. Yenjean Hwang**, an infectious disease specialist in Orinda who is affiliated with multiple hospitals in the area, including Alta Bates Summit Medical Center, Oakland and Alta Bates Summit Medical Center, Berkeley. As an Infectious disease specialist, she deals with a broad array of diseases caused by germs, ranging from the flu, to hospital acquired infections, to pneumonia. She received her medical degree from University of Chicago Pritzker School of Medicine and has been in practice for more than 20 years.

Dr. Yenjean talked to us about her work and association with the International Vision Volunteers Zimba Eye Clinic. International Vision Volunteers (IVV) was founded 27 years ago by Dr. James "Bud" Tysinger who devoted his life to providing high quality eye care in Africa. Rotary grants raised \$140,000 that made it possible to build a freestanding eye clinic with a modern operating room adjacent to



the already existing Zimba Mission Hospital. Every year, hundreds of surgeries are performed and thousands of patients receive care. Volunteer ophthalmologists, nurses, operating room techs, optometrists and other eye-care professionals pay their own travel expenses to hold eye camps four to six times a year to provide care. In the early 2000s, IVV opened one of the only public libraries in southern Zambia with the containers used to ship over operating room equipment. Many Rotarians from our district clubs have been involved with IVV both here in this country and visiting the clinic in Zambia.



### **ABOUT THE SPEAKER**

**Dr. Yenjean Hwang** received her BA from Stanford University and studied medicine at The University of Chicago, Pritzker School of Medicine. She did her Residency in Internal Medicine at the University of Utah Medical Center and a Fellowship at the Infectious Diseases at the University of Utah Medical Center. In her private practice she is with Diablo Infectious Diseases, Orinda Medical Group, Bay Infectious Diseases Medical group, and ABIM Certification Internal Medicine and Infectious Diseases. She holds positions with

Brown and Toland and serves on their Board of Directors as well as the E-Tools and Peer Review Committees. She is married to Dr. Ivan P. Hwang and has three children: Alexander (21), William (18), Nicholas (15), and Charlie (11). In her free time, she enjoys reading, travel, and swimming.

Dear Sponsors,

We would like to take the time on this special day to tell you how thankful we are for your continued support of the San Felipe Rotary Club's Scholarship program and to also update you on what is happening in our schools.

This has been another unusual year. Due to continued COVID mandates here a majority of our students are still engaged in online learning. We recently spoke with the Director (Principal) of our largest high school, and he tells us that they are hoping to be back to in person learning next semester which begins in February. Our two smaller high schools are using a mix of online and small group in person learning.

The first quarter reports were recently posted and most of our students continue to do well. The few students that were below 8.0 have received letters letting them know the importance of improving their grades. The semester grades will be posted in January and at that time they will be emailed to you.

Due to generous donations from our sponsors, The Rotary Club of San Felipe, local residents and Canadian Solar Company (who donated 67 computers) we have been able to distribute over 160 new and refurbished computers to needy students.

Sadly, due to COVID mandates we were not able to have our annual scholarship social in November so on November 13<sup>th</sup> we handed out backpacks filled with needed school supplies to over 170 scholarship students. Since we could only have 20 students in a 15-minute block it made for a LONG DAY, but it was nice to see all of our students again.
