HAPPY VALENTINE'S DAY



Although there were several Christian martyrs named Valentine, the day may have taken its name from a priest who was martyred about 270 CE by the emperor Claudius II Gothicus. According to legend, the priest signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom he had befriended and, by some accounts, healed from blindness. Other accounts hold that it was St. Valentine of Terni, a bishop, for whom the holiday was named, though it is possible the two saints were actually one person. Formal messages, appeared in the 1500s, and by the late 1700s commercially printed cards were being used.

One of earliest American valentine businesses on record was run by Esther Howland in Worcester, Mass. who ran a stationary store and made valentines by hand to sell during the 1850s. Then in 1911, Hallmark was founded and it became possible to print valentine cards in color at lower costs and became part of a general movement to turn holidays into opportunities for selling things from candy to flowers to magazine advertisements.



Next year's 2021-2022 theme for President-Elect Monica

is "Serve To Change Lives." In Past-President Julia's 2019-2020 term, it was "Rotary Connects the World" and the year before in Past-President Chris' term 2018-2019 it was "Be the Inspiration." Past-President Tommy's term "Rotary:



Making A Difference." My term 2016-2017 "Rotary Serving Humanity" and Past-President Dave's Term 2015-2016 it was "Be a Gift to the World." And so on... and so on and so on.

But Rotary themes don't date all the way back to


Mary Kemnitz said that Copart picked up 14 cars this past week, \$7,091 was sent to Lamorinda, and the same amount was deposited in our Club's account.


HAPPY/GRUMPY BUCKS
