The highlight of her Rotary adventures, she said, was a trip to Nigeria with 30 other Rotarians in 2016. "Being able to immunize babies reconfirmed my dedication to Rotary's efforts in eradicating polio."

Kathy earned her BA in Human Resource Management, and in her mid-50s she received her MBA in Nonprofit Management and Leadership. Her experience in the workforce and community economic development includes direct services to single moms entering the workforce, retraining dislocated timber workers, and managing such programs across Northern California. Highlights of her career are participating on the California Economic Revitalization Team for rural timber counties, being a founding member of a women's micro-enterprise organization, and developing the Leadership Siskiyou program.

She was born and lived the first few years of her life in Scotland before immigrating to Northern California with her family and holds dual citizenships in the US and the UK. She and her husband Bill, also a Rotarian, have two sons, live in Anderson, CA, and enjoy Alpine skiing, biking, and hiking around the many trails and lakes in the area.

## **Rotary and the United Nations**

Rotary's relationship with the United Nations dates back to 1945 when some 49 Rotarians served as delegates at the United Nations Charter Conference.


Today, Rotary holds the highest consultative status possible with the United Nations as a non-

governmental organization.

"Peace is a Process." a 1944 compilation of articles from The Rosarian magazine, focused on the new apportunities for international cooperation that would appear when the war ended. In "Setting the Pattern for Peace," historian and diplomat james Showell explained the differences between the falled League of Nations and the approach taken to form the United Nations.

The Rotarian magazine ran essays by authors, politicians, and other well-known figures that encouraged discussion on the topic of peace. Rotary published collections of these essays as "A World to Live In" (1942) and "Peace is a Process" (1944). Recognizing that the end of the war didn't eliminate the need to discuss these topics. Rotary continued the series with "Peace Demands Action" in 1947.

#### The United Nations

Rotary was present at the start of the United Nations in 1945. Rotary International was one of 42 organizations invited to serve as consultants to the U.S. delegation to the United Nations Conference on International Organization in San Francisco, California. USA (commonly called the UN charter conference). Additionally, many Rotary members and honorary members from around the world attended the conference as members of and consultants to their nations' delegations.

Rotary and the United Nations remain committed to creating lasting change that enhances international relationships, improves lives and communities, and creates a more peaceful world.

Today, Rotary International holds the highest consultative status offered to a nongovernmental organization by the UN'S Economic and Social Council (UNESCO). The Rotary Representative Network, established in 1991, maintains and furthers this relationship with several UN bodies, programs, commissions, and agencies.

## TODAY'S SPEAKER: Joan Ryan

Today's speaker is **Joan Ryan**, the Community Reuse Area Planner for the City of Concord, currently coordinating project teams on the preparation of the Concord Reuse Project Specific Plan for the Concord Naval Weapons Station. She is an experienced Community Planner with a range of backgrounds in both transit-oriented planning and housing, and has a demonstrated history of working as a project manager for a wide variety of projects, that includes plans and programs for local government. She is skilled in Land Use, Planning Policy, Entitlement Processing, Comprehensive Planning, Redevelopment, Project Implementation and Urban Design.



The Community and Economic Development Department's Planning Division implements and administers the policy direction of the City Council and the needs of the community with regard to the City's built environment, including its development and growth. The Planning Division provides the public with information about property regulations and is responsible for developing long-range planning policies and plans, evaluating development projects, implementing housing programs, and assisting with the Concord Reuse Project. She spoke about some of the current projects under construction and those that have been approved:

**Joan Ryan** attended Indiana University, received her BA in Urban Planning from Arizona State University, and her AICP Certification from the American Planning Association. She also managed the city's first-time home buyer, rehabilitation, home owner assistance loans, and processed local residential and commercial projects that assisted developers through the City's development pipeline.










## **PAUL HARRIS FELLOWS: Can You Find Your Name?**


