### TODAY'S SPEAKER: Gopal Kapur

**Program Chair Miles Bell** introduced **Gopal Kapur**, a member of the Rotary Club of Roseville, who spoke to us about a scholarship he and his wife started in India.

In 2007, Gopal Kapur and his wife Darlene started a program of educational support for bright students from families with income of less than \$125 per month that included five orphan students. The scholarship program includes school fees, books, stationary, uniforms, and incidental expenses. If, after high school graduation, students qualify for college/university admission, the scholarship program covers them to college graduation.



Gopal told us that at the start of the program, the sponsored children did not even know how to turn on a computer. They had never visited museums, libraries, or other learning centers. Today they have a student who is a CPA whose Delhi based company sent her for advanced training to Poland and Switzerland. There are four students with undergraduate technology degrees, one with a Masters in Computer Analysis, and six who have earned undergraduate accounting degrees.

In 1998 Gopal and Darlene got involved in the support of the Girls' Orphanage in Patiala, Punjab, India. They visit Patiala every winter for about two months and actively work on helping to improve the education, health, and nutrition of 35 to 40 girls. It was a long struggle to get things put on the right track, but now, as the girls graduate from high school, most are going to college or into computer training.

While Gopal and Darlene started their program in 2008, by 2011 the Roseville Rotary devoted full ongoing support to the program. In fact, today they decided to become our newest partners in Cars 2<sup>nd</sup> Chance. **Gopal Kapur** consults, writes, and educates on management excellence. He has authored three college-level textbooks and lectured at Harvard University, The Brookings Institution, University of California Berkeley and Davis, The Commonwealth Club, and many Rotary clubs. He was awarded the Distinguished Achievement Award by the President of India and was featured in the Rotarian magazine May 2009 and September 2019. He is the founder of "FamilyGreenSurvival, Inc." a not-forprofit, whose mission is to deliver a program of nutrition, education, and "EndLocalHunger."

### THE POWER OF ROTARY: From our President



Thank you for coming out tonight to see if you have won the drawing for our wine barrel. By buying all 250 tickets you are not only getting a chance to own some really fine wines, but you have helped us help the children of Clayton by paying \$6,250.00 toward our goal of renovating the community playground in conjunction with the City of Clayton. This program, buying new playground equipment, is what Rotary is all about: serving our community and serving internationally.

That's exactly what the Clayton Valley/Concord Sunrise Rotary Club of Rotary International, has been doing for 34 years. Here are just a few examples of how we put Service above Self:

- For 10 years we sorted and packed food for the Food Bank.
- For over 20 years, until Covid got in the way, we put on the Clayton 4<sup>th</sup> of July pancake breakfast. We give scholarships to high school students here and in our Rotary Sister club in San Felipe, Baja, Mexico.
- 15-years ago, we helped the people of San Felipe by donating a mammography machine and then helped set up a cancer clinic and support it with annual donations.
- We make repairs in the homes of seniors.
- We contribute to the student arts foundation run by our member Joan D'Onofrio that conducts arts competitions in our schools and now has expanded to schools in Mexico, Uganda and the Philippines.
- We obtained a grant to build batting cages at the Junior Optimist Baseball fields in Concord.
- For 20 years we gave dictionaries to every third grader in the area public schools.
- Ten years ago, we partnered with Rotary Clubs in Uganda to adopt a village of 2,500 residents to improve their economic conditions, attack malaria, build wells and sanitation facilities in the schools, and support a maternity clinic. And just this week construction started on a pediatric wing being paid entirely by one of our club members with equipment being paid for by our club's charitable fund.
- The pandemic hasn't slowed us down. Donations to our Cars2ndchance program has enabled us to contribute over \$68,000 to the Food Bank, with club members generously giving at least \$7,000 more.
- We continue the fight led by RI and the WHO to end polio throughout the world.

We try to live by Rotary's motto: Service Above Self. And when anyone asks that typical question: What is Rotary? Tell them that Rotary is a global network of 1.2 million neighbors, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves.

Alone none of us could do what we can achieve together.

AFTER EXPENSES WE WILL NET OVER \$6,000 TO CONTRIBUTE TO IMPROVEMENTS OF THE CHILDREN'S PLAY PARK IN CLAYTON.
