



TODAY'S SPEAKER



BATTALION CHIEF JAMIE BOWRON

Program Chair Miles Bell introduced us to 30-year firefighting veteran **Jamie Bowron** who has served for 19 years on the Oakland fire department. He is currently the Battalion Chief who spoke extemporaneously to us about his experience as a fire fighter and stressed the following:

- New clear zone around your structures is now100 feet instead of the old suggestion of 30 feet
- Keep roof line and gutters clear of fallen leaves, etc. One ember could get in the gutter or on the roof and start your house on fire
- Cal Fire is getting up to date on flying helicopters with night vision so they can continue to dump fire retardant during the cooler and more moist part of the night to help control fires
- Flying airplanes at night isn't in the works yet, still too dangerous
- 2015 Summer fires became the new normal
- Cal Fire used to do more VIP burns
- Got away from prescribed burns due to air quality
- Now thinking is that controlled burns are better than uncontrolled burns
- Cal Fire has increased their staff and are training the National Guard
- Fire season is now all year
- Dry lightning strikes like we had last year here is unusual, more common in the Northern most part of California (Trinity County)
- Due to fire tornados if you're told to evacuate DO IT IMMEDIATELY

The Oakland Fire Department was initially started in the 1860s as a volunteer fire department and was officially formed on March 13, 1869 when its first fire station was built. In 1908 the department bought their first motorized fire engine and in the 1920s, the department became one of the first in the nation to hire African American firefighters. The Fire Department provides fire protection and emergency medical services to the city of Oakland, and is responsible for 78 square miles for a population of 440,981 and have 25 stations and 24 engines.

CHARITABLE FUND UPDATE

Director Larry Hutchings, as President of the Charitable Fund, reported that at their Board meeting this week they approved \$4,600 for the San Felipe scholarship fund. Twenty three members signed up and paid. Meals on Wheels will receive \$500 and \$500 will be demoted to the Davis Sunrise Club for their solar project in Kenya. Another \$1,000 will be donated to the Walnut Creek Rotary's district grant for the White Pony Express project and noted that our club is working on a grant for the playaround equipment for the Clayton Community Park.






