TODAY'SSPEAKER

Program Chair Miles Bell introduced today's speaker, Mary Elizabeth Knox the Deputy District



Attorney of Contra Costa County, who spoke to us today about the current issues of the law that she is involved with. Before she spoke, she told us that she has been invited to speak at many Rotary clubs throughout the area.

Today she concentrated today's talk on:

Truancy: This is costing area schools millions of dollars each year and leads students directly to crime. They are trying to intervene before situations deteriorate even more by focusing on children ages 12 and below in situations where the parents are the ones who are essentially the contributing cause.

Gang rivalries: These are related to homicides and have reached epidemic proportions for young male African Americans and Hispanics young men.

Retail looting: This has become a thriving market and we are getting together with law enforcement and district attorney offices in other counties to problem solve.

Smash and Grab: This is the latest mysterious fad in crime and it is happening right in our own backyard and law enforcement personnel is trying to get to the root causes of the problem.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Mary Elizabeth Knox has worked in the Contra Costa County District Attorney's office since 1985 and serves as the Deputy District Attorney. She earned her Bachelor of Arts from UCLA in 1982 and her Juris Doctorate from Pepperdine University School of Law in 1985. Mary Elizabeth has taught numerous instructional courses at JFK School of Law, South Bay Police Academy, LAPD Rampart Division, and the California Gang Task Force and Division of Insurance.

She is a published author of copious articles and a book titled *Witness Four the Prosecution: The Jailhouse Informant*, 2006, and has received recognition and awards from the California Narcotics Division, Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors, and Congressman George Miller. She was also awarded 2017 Narcotics Prosecutor of the Year.

In addition to a most amazing career and dedication to the law, she participates in community service organizations that include "getVOCAL" and "Pillars of Hope."

MEDICAL UPDATE: By Torsten Jacobsen



The Covid crisis, with decreased outdoor activities coupled with our usual holiday indulgences, accentuates the importance of resolutions to maintain and improve our current and future health. So here are some facts:

The incidence of type 2 diabetes has increased 10 fold in the U.S. since 1985 due primarily to increased weight (also called obesity) and decreased physical activity. This is the so-called insulin resistant type, in that insulin does not decrease blood glucose levels. This results in a cascade of consequences including increased lipid breakdown and storage in vital organs, liver etc. This,

in addition to hypertension, (systolic BP over 130-affecting 85 million in the U.S.) results in increased incidence (4x) of congestive heart failure (CHF), stroke and renal disease and overall a10 years decrease in lifespan. Consumption of sugar soft drinks, Trans fats do not help, and statins, thiazides and beta blockers can also contribute; thus a spiral starts. Visual damage from diabetes is well established as is renal failure, vascular dementia and osteoporosis. 80+% of U.S. cases occur in people who are overweight.

What is your BMI (mean body index)? Go on-line and you can calculate it yourself, or you can ask Siri. Remember, much of the damage can be irreversible and when in a pre-diabetes state you may not know it, unless tested. Some 80 million Americans have blood glucose levels just below threshold (FBG 100-125). So what can/should you do? Here are a few suggestions:

- 1. Decrease weight by 10%. if your BMI is not ideal.
- 2. Do at least 150 minutes of brisk activity weekly like power walking. Try to reach your target heart rate. Look it up.
- 3. If over 45 have annual checkups especially if increased BP, on certain meds, increased weight, decreased activity, heart or renal problems, strong family history; include dilated eye exam if any of the above.



AMAZING SCULPTURE FROM STEVE WEIR

Clayton Bailey was an artist known as part of the "Funk Movement" in California. His house/studio was on the Carquinez Scenic Road between Pt. Costa and Crockett. Clayton was known for many wild styles including his world famous fence gargoyles. Steve coveted one for many years as he often cycled past his place on a his cycle trip to Vallejo. Clayton died last year and the Epperson Galleria in Crockett featured his last two gargoyles. Steve saw this one, scooped the last one up, and titled this piece "Gargoyle with Listerine."



Steve Weir and **John Hemm** own one of Bailey's sculptures that they are sharing with us. Clayton Bailey's (1939-2020) incredible universe defies description. One of the University of California-Davis Funk artists, Bailey uses ceramics, metals, and mixed media to create sculptures that give life to the fantasies going on in his head. His amazingly crafted pieces have been described by others, and indeed by himself, as "Nut Art" or "Crock Art" - they move, they make noises, and above all they refuse to take themselves or the world seriously.
