PASTOR HOPKINS PLEADS "Put Down Your Guns"

Gun violence nationwide, but particularly in Oakland, was the subject of today's presentation by the **Reverend Dr. James Hopkins**. Believing that the call of each church is to seek the peace of the community they are in, Pastor Jim has long been involved in the efforts to reduce gun violence in Oakland and was one of the first Oakland pastors to advocate for the adoption and implementation of the Ceasefire strategy that is a community-based, research-guided violence prevention program that City of Oakland adopted in 2012.



The philosophy resulted in significantly reduced rates of homicide in cities across the USA. For several years it worked successfully in Oakland until Covid-19 pandemic reduced the ability of workers and volunteers to keep the program active. And he is still committed to the cause.

Reverend Hopkins has been Senior Minister of Oakland's Lakeshore Avenue Baptist Church since 1989. He is currently the Co-Chair of the Faith in Action East Bay Board of Directors, the President of Lakeshore Avenue Business Improvement District, a board member of the Baptist Joint Committee for Religious Liberty and a founding pastor of the Association of Welcoming and Affirming Baptists.




Torsten Jacobsen reported that 43,000 visits were made to the cancer clinic for both diagnostic tests and patient education.

HAPPY/GRUMPYBUCKS



MARY KEMNITZ had a happy 10 bucks this morning. It seems someone from Rossmoor donated a most unusual item to C2C. A golf cart,








AND THE WINNER IS...

LASTLAUGH

A TRUE STORY

ON JULY 20, 1969, AS COMMANDER OF THE APOLLO 11 LUNAR MODULE, NEIL ARMSTRONG WAS THE FIRST PERSON TO SET FOOT ON THE MOON. HIS FIRST WORDS AFTER STEPPING ON THE MOON, "THAT'S ONE SMALL STEP FOR MAN, ONE GIANT LEAP FOR MANKIND," WERE TELEVISED TO EARTH AND HEARD BY MILLIONS. BUT, JUST BEFORE HE RE-ENTERED THE LANDER, HE MADE THE ENIGMATIC REMARK "GOOD LUCK, MR. GORSKY."

MANY PEOPLE AT NASA THOUGHT IT WAS A CASUAL REMARK CONCERNING SOME RIVAL SOVIET COSMONAUT. HOWEVER, UPON CHECKING, THERE WAS NO GORSKY IN EITHER THE RUSSIAN OR AMERICAN SPACE PROGRAMS. OVER THE YEARS, MANY PEOPLE QUESTIONED ARMSTRONG AS TO WHAT THE 'GOOD LUCK, MR. GORSKY' STATEMENT MEANT, BUT ARMSTRONG ALWAYS JUST SMILED.

THIS TIME HE FINALLY RESPONDED BECAUSE HIS MR. GORSKY HAD JUST DIED, SO NEIL ARMSTRONG FELT HE COULD NOW ANSWER THE QUESTION. HERE IS THE ANSWER TO "WHO WAS MR. GORSKY?"
