TODAY'S **SPEAKER**

PROMOTE GOOD GOVERNMENT AT AFFORDABLE COST

Program Chair Miles Bell introduced today's speaker, **Susan Pricco**, who spoke to us today about the Contra Costa Taxpayers Association (CoCo Tax) which is a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization whose mission is to fight for "good government at affordable cost."

Founded in 1937, CoCo Tax leads the way in providing fiscal oversight of local government. Susan said: "We actively resist unwarranted taxes and fees, discriminatory regulations, ill-advised public expenditures and government secrecy, inefficiency and waste."



Susan's presentation was rather nostalgic as it brought back memories of the late **John Wolfe** who spent 11 years as the Executive Vice-President of the Contra Costa Taxpayers Association. Here are a few items Susan discussed that CoCo Tax handles:

- Animal services saw the Pinole shelter closed so only Martinez remains open
- Home prices continue to rise
- Bridge tolls will increase to \$7
- Walnut Creek taxes will increase by 1/2% bringing their tax fee up to 9.25%
- School district pensions

Susan Pricco is a retired courtroom clerk for Contra Costa Superior Court, serving the County for over 35 years. She has been President of Contra Costa Taxpayers Association for two years and has testified on pending legislation. She is still a member of the Board and intends to remain an advocate. She lives in the Vineyard section of Sacramento.

THE FOUR STAGES OF INDIAN LIFE

Torsten Jacobsen tells us that In 2020 (pre-covid) Rotary experienced 18% growth worldwide (total membership 1,053,087 members) with 570 new clubs in India accounted for about 20% of this growth with 102 new clubs (or about 20%). India's growth can be in part attributed to what is referred to as The Four Stages of Indian Life:



- STAGE 1 Study and grow
- STAGE 2 Work and build relationships
- STAGE 3 Support family and others and donate
- STAGE 4 Give it ALL away before death

This attitude explains the size of some Rotary projects. For example, one project visited was a school and university for all Castes with on campus living for over 2000 students and 140 teachers established and maintained by over 800 Rotary donations over 30 years. Another club had established a 3 story facility for around the clock total care for400 widows, orphaned kids and mentally disabled. The 40+ participants on the International Ride for Rotary through personal and club contributions will establish water lines and Grundfos pumps to bring in clean water from several kilometers away.




