Celebrating IVV

Yenjean Hwang has served as the Chair of the IVV for the past seven years. Along with her ophthalmologist husband, **Dr. Ivan Hwang**, they started going to Zambia with Bud Tysinger several years ago. When Bud decided to retire, Yenjean said, "We could not bear to see all of Bud's work disappear, so she and her husband took over as Chairs."

She first met Fred when Bud took her to a Clayton Valley/Concord Sunrise meeting. Fred immediately helped coach her and the club through their own Global grant application since Fred had been through the pain and suffering himself on IVV's behalf.

Dr. James "Bud" Tysinger founded IVV (international Vision Volunteers) after serving on a mission in West Africa and found that





restoring sight profoundly and immediately impacted patients' lives. Since then, he has devoted his life to providing high quality eye care in Africa. In 1995, he was able to gather the funds to build a freestanding eye clinic and modern operating room in Zimba, Zambia.

Every year, hundreds of surgeries are performed, and thousands of patients receive care. Volunteer ophthalmologists, nurses, operating room techs, optometrists, and other eye-care professionals pay their own travel expenses to hold eye camps four to six times a year to provide care. They also opened one of the only public libraries in southern Zambia with the containers

used to ship over operating room equipment.

Dr. Yenjean Hwang is an infectious disease physician whose practice is in Orinda; She works at Alta

Bates and Summit Medical Centers where she is the director of Infection control. Her husband is an ophthalmologist. She grew up in the East Bay and they raised four 4 sons.

THE CELEBRATION








A NEW FUN RAISER: First Ever Poker Tournament
