
The Blackhawk Museum: It's Not Just Cars

David Behring, President of the Wheelchair Foundation since 2003, talked to us about the Blackhawk Museum that was founded in 1988 by Ken Behring and Don Williams. The museum is best known for its significant collection of classic, rare, and one-of-a-kind automobiles, but the museum has significantly expanded into five unique galleries: The Classic Car Collection of course, The Spirit of the Old West, Into China, Art of Africa, and World of Nature. It is a one-of-a-kind and educational experience for all ages that truly encompasses "many worlds in one museum." David talked about the galleries that housed the old west, China, and the art of Africa.

The Wheelchair Foundation is a non-profit organization that seeks to deliver a wheelchair to every child, teen and adult

who needs one, but cannot afford to buy one. To date the organization has provided over 1,160,000 wheelchairs to people in 156 countries. Prior to that, he was President of the Blackhawk Museum, a Smithsonian Institution affiliate that is one of the most spectacular classic car museums in the world. He spearheaded "The Spirit of the Old West" Gallery. From 1993-1997 David was President of the Seattle Seahawks and was a member of the NFL Finance Committee. He was in the homebuilding and land development professions in the East Bay before that period.

David has been active in Rotary for over 22 years serving as President of his club as well as an



Assistant District Governor, a member of the Exchange Club and serves on the Boards of Leadership San Ramon Valley and the Danville Chamber of Commerce.

A graduate of Princeton's history department, he has always loved history and served for 6 years on the Boards of the Smithsonian National Museum of American History and the National History Day. David has been active with WWII veterans and is an Honorary Lifetime Member of the Vietnam Veterans of Diablo Valley. He has also served as President and Vice President of the All-Wars Memorial Foundation. David has traveled extensively around the world and especially enjoys visiting military and historical sites.

He has lived in Danville since 1980, is married to May and has a 28-year-old married daughter living in Texas, a three-month-old grandson, and a 24-year-old son working in North Carolina.




PEOPLE OF ACTION STORY: Our Story Our Way



Don't keep your story a secret. It is up to you to help spread the Rotary Story.




