
## **TODAY'S SPEAKER: ANDRZEJ STEWART**

## All Aboard for Planet Mars

**Stewart**, spacecraft operator who regaled us with spectacular photos from the universe, space stations, and images of space workers living inside a spacecraft.

He spoke about his yearlong role as Chief Engineering Officer of HI-SEAS IV, a year-long Mars simulation in Hawaii. The site was actually on the side of a volcano where the landscape was much like it might be on mars. The crew was allowed to go outside occasionally but only when in space suits to get simulated soil samples.

He spoke of how NASA prepares for these missions by simulating the environments that crews would be subjected to and showed the environment of his first two-week asteroid mission simulation where the crew quarters were extremely tight.





#### **ABOUT THE SPEAKER**

**Andrzej Stewart** is an experienced spacecraft operator for a wide variety of NASA missions. He's worked as a spacecraft mission controller for the Spitzer Space Telescope, Juno, GRAIL, and NASA's Mars orbiter fleet. Andrzej now works in Mission Control at the Johnson Space Center, training as an Orion spacecraft Navigator for NASA's upcoming Artemis missions. He is also a 1st Lieutenant in the Civil Air Patrol, serving as the Texas Wing Assistant Emergency Services Training Officer, and as a Search and Rescue/Disaster Recovery Mission Pilot and Aerial Photographer.


Andrzej earned degrees in Aerospace Engineering from the University of Texas at Austin, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and aspires to be a NASA astronaut. In pursuing that, he has served as the Flight Engineer of HERA C2M2, a two-week asteroid mission simulation at the Johnson Space Center; as Chief Engineering Officer of HI-SEAS IV's year-long Mars simulation in Hawaii; and was a test subject crewmember for the Exploration Atmosphere's 11-day study in the 20-Foot Chamber at the Johnson Space Center.



## NEWS ROM THE BAJA MAR ROTARY: The Baja Mar Gatellite Club



The Baja Mar Rotary is a Satellite club, consisting of 12 members and growing, was Started by Bob and Michelle MacDonald and already they have completed one project. They had a better Internet system installed in a school so they could use all of their computers instead of a few at a time. They are working on two other projects: 1) providing a classroom made from shipping containers, 2) they are working to provide equipment for a biology lab. Scholarships are a main goal for their satellite club. They are also planning to sell See's Candy in November.

## UGANDA: Update

**Deb Luyiima** reported the following:

**PATIENTS**: We had a total of 186 patients during the month. The most common diseases being bacterial infections and respiratory diseases (especially amongst the children) and Malaria.

BIRTHS: We had two normal and healthy deliveries. Both





baby girls.

**NGO**: We are in the process of registering to partner with an NGO which is partially funded by Uganda Community Based Health Care Association. The annual registration fees is 850usd that will enable the clinic access drugs at no cost that treat common diseases like malaria, diarrhea, test kits and the like. Hopefully we shall benefit from the partnership by 2023.

**DONATIONS**: Thanks to CVCS members for their generous donations from the Charitable Fund that will go a long way toward providing salary to one of the clinicians for one year.

**EBOLA**: The Ebola epidemic outbreak is prevalent in Uganda; two districts are under lock down. We thank God our own Luwero District is not one of them. However, we are encouraging the community and our medical staff to take precautions.

And thanks so much for your continuous service to humanity.






## PEOPLE OF ACTION STORY: Our Story Our Way

## **HAPPYBUCKS**


