

NATIONAL WOMANS HISTORY MONTH AND IT STARTED IN CALIFORNIA



CAN YOU BELIEVE IT STARTED IN SONOMA!

Women's History Month celebrates the contributions of women in history, society, and culture. It has been annually observed in the United States, the United Kingdom, and Australia, every March since 1987. It also corresponds with International Women's Day on March 8. The month-long commemoration started with Women's History Day in 1978, organized by the school district of **Sonoma, California**. Hundreds of students participated in the essay competitions, many presentations were given, and a parade was held in Santa Rosa. The idea caught on and, a few years later, school districts, communities, and organizations all over the country were celebrating the day. In 1980, the National Women's History Alliance wanted the holiday to be observed as a national week, and this was backed by President Jimmy Carter, who issued the first proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National Women's History Week. The following year, Congress made it a national observance and six years later, it became the month of March.

TOGETHER, WE CAN DELIVER

President Monica Fraga introduced us to **Caitlin Sly**, Executive director, and **Sherry Nadworny**, Director of Development and Community Relations, who spoke to us about Meals on Wheels an organization we all know that delivers food to seniors throughout Contra costa County. But what we learned today that delivering meals is just the tip of the iceberg of all the many supportive services they also provide. It was quite an eye-opener to learn that Meals on Wheels also offers:

Health and Wellness: workshops and information on how to stay healthy.

Care Management provides guidance on housing, elder abuse, depression, and long term care needs.

Grocery Bag that is full of food to seniors who are housebound and still able to cook a meal

C.C. Cafes provide a hot meal for mobile seniors five days a week at local senior centers

The question and answer session that followed was quite interesting as **Eric Rehn** reminded us that our club used to work with Meals on Wheels through our Home Team program that will soon be up and running when **Clayton Worsdell** and **Rich Lueck** get the Community Services program started again.

Jeff Wilson, put into words the experience he had with a woman he met through the Meals on Wheels **Friendly Visitors, Callers, and Helpers** program. Jeff read this to us:



I signed up for the friendly visitor program through Meals on Wheels and was matched with a woman named Regina. Regina was lovely. I found out that she had a great sense of humor, she had a son who she loved, and that she loved daytime talk shows. Twenty plus years ago, Regina had a stroke. Unfortunately, this stroke caused her to become bedridden permanently. Through the Friendly Visitors program, I found out that Regina wanted people to come and read to her. I thought it would be fun. I was told she was very much into Agatha Christie, so I knew I wouldn't get bored, at all. From March of 2019 to March of 2020, I met with Regina once a week and read many books and short stories to her. We read many Agatha Christie stories, Harry Potter, Raymond Chandler stories, and more. Her speech was very limited and at first, I didn't know how much damage was done to her brain and how much she would be taking in from what I was reading. However, on the first day with her, I was reading and a humorous line came up and immediately after I read it she snorted laughter. I was all in, at that point. I had an absolute blast reading to her for that year and then COVID hit. Volunteers could no longer meet in person with their matches. It was tough and phone reading/conversations would have been tough for Regina and her setup, so we didn't continue once COVID took control of our lives. I just recently found out that Regina passed on. I was sad that I didn't get to say goodbye and didn't get a chance to go to her funeral (hence my "closure" with this post). I know that Regina is no longer in pain (which, even while managed, was still sometimes rough for her) and that she is resting completely, now. I miss her. I actually didn't realize how much I missed her until writing those three words just now... RIP, Regina.

If you have made it this far into my story, thank you. And now here is some info for you a!! C2C: Update



From now on, if your name is picked, you will have to answer a question to claim the prize. Study hard, everyone.




