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

WORLD IMMUNIZATION WEEK APRIL 24-30, 2022



VACCINATIONS WORK

This is World Immunization Week and **Trustee Chair John Germ** of the Rotary Foundation announced that since 1988, Rotary and our global partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative have achieved a 99.9% worldwide reduction in polio cases. In 2020, Africa was declared free of wild poliovirus, and today, cases in the remaining wild-polio endemic countries, Afghanistan and Pakistan, are at their lowest level in history. This is cause for cautious optimism, but before we can celebrate the end of polio, we must remain vigilant and continue our work to immunize up to 400 million children all over the world each year.

John said: "The successes achieved in preventing and treating disease would not be possible without donors like you, so please continue to support our efforts."

TODAY'SSPEAKER

SAVING AND UNDERSTANDING OUR PLANET



Torsten Jacobson, today's speaker who happens to be a 19-year-member of our club, talked to us about catastrophic threats to the planet and human survival that include natural resource depletion, massive population growth, mass extinction, ecosystem collapse, unchecked human population growth, global heating, pollution, increasing food insecurity, nuclear weapons, pandemics, dangerous new technologies, denial, and misinformation.


His presentation took up a few of these issues but he started with the study of bats and how important they are to our planet as they play an important role in our ecosystem. They eat insects, pollinate crops, and fertilize plants with their waste. They also carry some pretty nasty

pathogens that are among the most deadly to humans: Ebola, SARS, rabies, MERS, Nipah, Hendra Viruses, and histoplasmosis.

The current population of planet earth is 7.9 billion. By 2050 that will increase to 9.9 billion, and he pointed out that aside from going green and cutting down drastically in pollution, the only REAL solution is stabilizing world population growth by assuring that every person everywhere has access to contraception, sex education, and basic family planning. ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Torsten Jacobsen was born in Shanghai China during the height of the Japanese invasion/occupation, but because his family had diplomatic immunity they were able to survive four years of indoor house confinement and lockdown. He grew up in Denmark but when he reached the age of 14 his father was assigned to the USA at which time he was admitted to Veterinary Medical School at UC Davis. He then decided to continue his studies at UC San Francisco's Medical School for the 9-10 year post-graduate grind to become an orthopedic surgeon. In between the two studies, he crashed an exchange student gathering in Oslo where he met and married Tineke. He served in the 8th Army in the



capacity of a trauma surgeon with the rank of Major and finally ended up in Ramstein, Germany where their two oldest daughters were born. He was invited to the Netherlands for a period of four years in the capacity of associate professor and focused on children's orthopedics and hand surgery primarily. Shortly after returning to California and the birth of their two younger daughters he started to practice at John Muir's Concord campus with an emphasis on trauma and arthroscopic surgery and functioned eventually as head of the department. Tineke meanwhile started up a physical therapy center with evolutionary quantitative analysis for occupational injuries, rehab, and hardening. Subsequent to retirement, the focus went to international missions in such places as the Philippines, Vietnam, and multiple forays to establish, equip, and teach in Ethiopia and Uganda with SIGN (Surgical Implant Generation Network). She made trips to Haiti after the devastating earthquake in 2010 that took 160,000 lives. Torsten started out in Rotary initially in the Concord club before transferring to Clayton Valley/Concord where he has been a member for 19 years.

UKRAINE UPDATE: Donate to the Disaster Response Fund

The Rotary Foundation has created an official channel for Rotary members and other donors around the world to contribute funds to support relief efforts underway by Rotary districts. The Foundation has designated the Disaster Response Fund as the main avenue for this. Thanks to the generosity of Rotary members and others, the fund, to date, has received more than \$10.4 million in contributions. These funds are being distributed to Rotary districts that apply for Disaster Response grants and will be used to provide relief to refugees or other victims of the crisis, including items such as water, food, shelter, medicine, and clothing.

So far, 64 disaster response grants, totaling \$1,799,873, have been awarded to support those affected by the war and more than 5.3 million people have fled and are in dire need of emergency aid. Rotary clubs in Europe and around the world have stepped up their relief work, some working on the ground to help displaced families.




