TODAY'S SPEAKER 6/30

MAJOR GWYN EDWARD JONES

Today's speaker, **Major Gwyn Edward Jones**, presented a brief history of the Salvation Army that began when a man named William Booth began his ministerial career in England in 1852, he abandoned the concept of the traditional church pulpit in favor of taking the gospel of Jesus Christ directly to the people. Walking the streets of London, he preached to the poor, the homeless, the hungry, and the destitute.

When fellow clergymen disagreed with Booth's unconventional approach, he and his wife Catherine withdrew from the church to train evangelists throughout England. The couple returned to the East End of London in 1865, where many followers joined their fight. Within 10 years their organization operating under the name "The




Christian Mission," had over 1,000 volunteers and evangelists. From that point onward, converts became soldiers of Christ and were known then, as now, as Salvationists. They launched an offensive throughout the British Isles that, in spite of violence and persecution, converted 250,000 Christians between 1881 and 1885. Their message spread rapidly, gaining a foothold in America and soon after in Canada, Australia, France, Switzerland, India, South Africa, Iceland, and Germany. Today, The Salvation Army is active in virtually every corner of the world and serves in over 100 countries, offering the message of God's healing and hope to all those in need.




JEFF WILSON




KEN NISHIMORI gave a happy five bucks because he was so happy that he met his goal to the Rotary Foundation.





A special presentation of the Paul Harris Fellowship was bestowed on **Kimiyo Tahira Dowell** a member of **Bill Selb** and **Clayton Worsdell's** church. This was a truly unique honor.

Due to the tireless efforts of **Kimiyo Tahira Dowell** she succeeded in getting the Mt. Diablo High School to grant retroactive diplomas to those Japanese students BACK IN 1942 who were forced to leave school and incarcerated during World War II. Ms. Dowell worked with the Mt. Diablo Unified School Board who agreed to revise its policies and pave the way for the presentation of diplomas as part of Mt. Diablo High School's graduation ceremony held at the Concord Pavilion May 23. Many of the former students are now deceased and those who are still alive are in their 90s, making it difficult for them to attend the ceremony in person. However, up to two dozen family members of the former students attended and accepted the retroactive diplomas on behalf of their parents, grandparents, uncles and aunts. Ms. Dowell was, herself, incarcerated with her parents when she was a toddler.




