

## GLOBALINITATIVES

### GUATAMALA: Skip McCowan



Today's speaker, **Skip McCowan**, Member of District International Service Committee, told us that he attended the second Uniendo America project fair in January 2020, in Antigua, Guatemala. More than 400 Rotarians from North America and all seven Central American countries met to share ideas about projects that will improve the lives of thousands of people by decreasing the transmission rate of preventable infectious diseases among rural families by improving sanitary conditions and hygiene within the home, resulting in healthier, more productive families. As a result of friendships made at the project fairs, Lamorinda Sunrise and Vista Hermosa Rotary in Guatemala City are funding a project that installs concrete floors in the homes of families in the village of Tecpan, not far from Guatemala City.

Skip told us that a study by the World Bank showed that concrete floors significantly improve the health of young children. A complete substitution of dirt floors by cement floors in a house leads to a 78 percent reduction in parasitic

infestations, a 49 percent reduction in diarrhea, an 81 percent reduction in anemia, and a 36 to 96 percent improvement in cognitive development for only \$1,000 a home. For more information, contact Skip at <a href="mailto:jackbmccowan@gmail.com">jackbmccowan@gmail.com</a>.

### Mike Hatfield

Partnering with Skip's Guatemala program is **Mike Haffield**, Project Director of StoveTeam International, told us that 4 billion people cook using dangerous indoor fires worldwide. Smoke from indoor cooking fires is a leading cause of death among children under age five—it kills more people than AIDS and malaria combined.

He told us that their vision and dream for the future is the complete eradication of open cooking fires throughout the world and said: "communities and families thrive because they have been given back their health and their time. In our vision, cooking ceases to be a major contributor to climate change and deforestation, and there is universal global knowledge that cooking over open fires is hazardous to health and the environment."



### UGANDA: Herbert Muyinga

**Herbert Muyinga** of the Muyenga Rotary Club of Uganda reported from zoom with an update on the Clinic. He said: "The facility is up and running and both the maternity and children's wings are operational. We average six outpatient kids and five adults per day. There were five new births this month thanks to our family planning control sensitization as compared to many more a few years back. There is an average of three inpatients daily. Several cases of communicable diseases—malaria, coughs, and general fevers—still haunt our village people.

We continue to up our vigilance at the clinic with multiple approaches and strategies. As of July 1st, we have engaged a hospital administrator cum pediatrician who comes in with lots of experience and plays a major role by overseeing the daily running at the facility. She reports at the center three days a week. In addition, both Deb and I are on hand once week. As of today: we have five permanent medical staff consisting of the one mentioned, two midwives, a lab technician, a general clinician, a security guard, and a cleaner.

We have, however, challenges meeting their salaries in time as a big portion of our collections are from the sale of medicines. The patients hardly pay on time or at time of falling sick. It's very tasking picking all the debts in time. Medical insurance is unheard of in the villages. This current inflationary trend has not made it any better due to the high cost of living. One staff left as we declined his

instant salary increment. We,

however, we have so far two Rotary members each offering \$50 a month which we intend to match 100%. We are still waiting on our Ministry of Health who promised support to avail free drugs. Process is very slow as we continue submission application documents against the grant offer. There is also this Protestant Medical Bureau which we are also lobbying for support."



### DISTRICT AWARDS: Time to celebrate


