TODAY'S SPEAKER

A BRILLIANT PRESENTATION: Russ Anderson

In 1936 Jesse Owens won four gold medals at the Olympics and you could buy a new Oldsmobile for \$665. That's the year Erv Lehmer got the franchise from General Motors to sell New Oldsmobile's. And that's when They converted his father, Lew Lehmer's Golden West Service Station, into Lehmer's. Much has changed in the world since 1936, but the Lehmer family continues to sell GM vehicles in Concord, and in 1938 Lehmer's added the GMC truck franchise to their dealership and has been selling GMC trucks ever since.





Our 10-year member, **Russ Anderson**, took us on a winding path into the car business. When he was 18 years old, he joined the navy and became an engine man on submarines. He remembers, "I liked GM just because our submarine diesels were 1,600-horsepower GM diesels that were first built for World War II." After leaving the sea he came back to California and joined the fire department. He also met his future wife Carolyn at Mel's Diner (made famous in the movie "American Graffiti"). He would drive used cars from his father-in-law's dealership to his firefighter job and he would often sell the car he was driving to an interested customer. Finally, his boss told him to choose between firefighting and the car business, and Russ ended up as a salesman at Lehmer's. Russ soon became general manager of Lehmer's and in 1971 opened his own GM dealership in nearby Walnut Creek, spending 21 years there before eventually returning to Lehmer's.

The three Rotarian siblings, Russ Anderson, Darren Anderson, and Tammy Freeman, represent the next generation of the Lehmer Anderson family and have assumed leadership roles. They have been involved in the business since the 1990's and now run the day-to-day operations. As Managing General Partners, they are taking Lehmer's into the future.

Russ brought us up to date on the situation in the auto industry. He said mechanics used to be guys working under the hood of the cars. Now they are computer savvy technicians. Everything is computerized and Russ explained how hard Covid has affected the industry. Chips are the biggest problem as they became scarce, and orders were cancelled causing the loss of 13 million vehicles. Rental companies cancelled orders as well.

When asked when will things get back to normal? Russ said, "We will just have to wait and see."

POLIO: Is it back?

Rich Lueck and **Torsten Jacobsen** called our attention to the fact that polio has been detected in New York City wastewater, suggesting that the virus that causes the disease is probably circulating in the city. The announcement came three weeks after a man in Rockland County, NY, was diagnosed with polio that left him paralyzed. Health officials fear that the detection of polio in New York City's wastewater could precede other cases of paralytic polio. The spread of the virus poses a risk to unvaccinated people, but a three-dose course of the vaccine provides at least 99 percent protection. This could be the very tip of the iceberg and an indication that there may be several hundred cases circulating in the community. It was noted that the majority of people with polio don't have symptoms which means they can spread the virus without knowing it.

MOLLY AVILEZ gave two bucks today as a really good friend of hers was diagnosed with cancer. On


the uptick she went out and bought her first wig.
