ALL IN THE FAMILY AND BEYOND

No, Stanley Tucci wasn't our speaker. He just happens to be



on the cover of the March 21, 2022, edition of People magazine that featured the Ouimet family who actually were our speakers this morning—yes, all of them.

We learned today that Kristi, Don Ouimet's daughter-in-law is a mother of three in Antioch who had been scrolling through a Facebook group dedicated to people who suffer from Primary Hyperoxaluria type 1 (PH1), a life-threatening liver condition that

leads to kidney damage, and requires a kidney and liver transplant. Why? Because her daughter, 19-year-old

Carswell, had been diagnosed with the condition at six, and her son, 11-year-old Matthew, began showing symptoms



when he was just two months old. Her middle son, Patrick, does not have the disease. Carswell and Mathew told us about their experiences with PH1.

Kristi become a fierce advocate for others with the disease, and connected with Govinda Regmi, 34, who told her on one of her posts that he was dying of the disease because of the lack of medical care in Nepal, she knew she needed to help him. They bonded over his desperation immediately and Kristi invited him to stay with her family and pursue treatment.

Both families formed a connection that is unbreakable — and never looked back.

Jeff Wilson and Vicki Sexton have been working with the City of Clayton on the plans for the October 16th run event, They informed us that Chief Warren, who approved the course that would have worked for our event, is no longer with the Clayton PD. Interim Chief Kreins is now in charge and he said we can no longer have our event on that course. They gave us another option that unfortunately, will not work for a running event because it is not safe. They did give us a secondary option which could potentially work but would involve some minor upgrades to a 30-meter section of the course as well as the approval of MDUSD.

The prospect of working with Interim Chief Kreins and the City of Clayton, due to their restrictions and requirements for an event of this nature, is proving complicated. The question is do we want to pursue working with Clayton and having the event here or switching to another location in Concord. Additionally, due to these delays is the October 15th date viable.

Or a trip to Guatemala to experience the power of a multi-Rotary District effort to empower Mayan woman to break the cycle of poverty and domestic abuse.

After being a Rotarian since 2003, Suzanne has served in multiple positions including club president, assistant district governor and membership ambassador. Like others, she has grown from the Rotary experience in ways she never imagined. Her favorite role (so far) has been serving as Club President – an adventure-on-steroids that gave her the opportunity to feel and live the power of Rotary locally, regionally and around the world.

As District Governor in 2022-23, Suzanne's hope is to give all 74 District 5160 Club Presidents the same adrenalin-charged WOW experience (we have 72 clubs with two co-presidents this year.) Kirk, her artist-husband of 42 years, will be sharing the journey, while their daughter Stephanie, who is traveling through South America and Europe for 12 months, will be cheering them on. POLIO: An Update

June, an unvaccinated, twenty-year-old man in Rockland County, NY, became the first person in nearly a decade to be diagnosed with polio in the United States. Polio can be prevented, but not cured. Polio has never been eradicated in Afghanistan or Pakistan, and, earlier this year, more than a year after Africa was declared free of it, the virus paralyzed children in Malawi and Mozambique. In Ukraine, polio has paralyzed at least 19 people this year. In Israel, eight cases of polio in children were reported in the spring. In June, after the virus was detected in London sewage samples, authorities declared a "national incident" and offered polio booster shots to all children who live in the city and are between the ages of one and nine. In 1988, when the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was launched, there were around three hundred and fifty thousand polio cases a year across more than a hundred countries. Since then, the incidence of polio has decreased 99.9 per cent. Vaccination campaigns are believed to have averted more than two million cases of paralysis.

Rotary clubs worldwide are still doing their part to achieve zero cases.
