THE FATHER OF LABOR DAY



The idea of Labor Day was the brainchild of Peter J. McGuire, a vice president of the American Federation of Labor, who, after a visit to Toronto where he saw parades celebrating labor that May, had put forward the initial proposal in the spring of 1882. According to McGuire, on May 8, 1882, he made a proposition to the fledgling Central Labor Union in New York City that a day be set aside for a "general holiday for the laboring classes." According to McGuire, he further recommended that the event should begin with a street parade as a public demonstration of organized labor's solidarity and strength to which participating local unions could sell tickets as a fundraiser. He suggested the first Monday in September as an ideal date for such a public celebration. Congress passed a bill recognizing the first Monday of September as Labor Day and making it an official federal holiday. President Grover Cleveland signed the bill into law on June 28, 1894. The federal law, however, only made it a holiday for federal workers. As late as the 1930s, unions were encouraging workers to strike to make sure they got the day off. They did, and now all U.S. states, the District of Columbia, and the United States territories have subsequently made Labor Day a statutory holiday.
