TODAY'S SPEAKER: William K. Wesley You Definitely Can be Happy.

So, says **2023-2024 President Elect William K. Wesley** of the Fairfield-Suisun Rotary Club who was



today's speaker. He is a Full Life Balance author, transformational speaker, Top Performance Coach, financial educator, and corporate trainer who entertained us with his topic of the four factors of happiness and actually wrote a book on the topic. Currently a national financial speaker and content creator for My Secure Advantage, he creates and delivers financial education via in-person and webinar sessions. William has spent over 20 years in the financial industry in various positions including financial advisor, bank branch manager and regional investor education manager for firms such as Citibank, Merrill Lynch, and Charles Schwab.

William talked to us about what he has concluded are the factors required to attain happiness. He said: "there are four basic factors. The Four Factors of Happiness is simply the result of years of reflection, interaction, observation, conclusions, and practice of a happy man. Again, I did perform some objective and subjective

research; but there are no tables, charts or graphs that summarize and illustrate my findings. But the research is complete, and the results are clear. You can be happy. What I present in these few pages is true and the recommendations do work."

He said that the four basics that comprise the key to happiness are: Laughter, Listen, Care, and Compare. You can delve deeply into this list by purchasing his book titled "The Four Factors of Happiness."

ABOUT THE SPEAKER

William received his MBA and his JD from Golden Gate University in San Francisco where he, as a professor, also taught Management Principles, Management Communication and Organizational Behavior. William received his BS in Business from the University of San Francisco. He is an authority on productivity, communication, presentation training, networking and life balance and has been

featured and quoted often. He was Planning Commissioner for the City of Fairfield and former San Francisco Human Rights Commissioner.

He is also a certified Minimum Continuing Legal Education (MCLE) provider with the State Bar of California and delivers Continuing Education training to attorneys. William has written and published 2 books: "Full Life Balance" and "The Four Factors of Happiness -OPEN in case of EMERGENCY."

William is one of six siblings who lives in San Francisco with his wife and is proud to tell us that he has five children and 15 grandchildren. William was Rotarian of The Year of the Fairfield-Suisun Rotary Club for 2016-2017 and enjoys sailing, reading, writing, playing tennis, golf, and chess.


WINE RAFFEL: Update


We need volunteers for our March meetings.

at See's Candies and Emily was told to get a one-pound box and have them fill it with all of her favorite candies!


