
MORNING RITUALS



Deb said that they have observed that 90% of the babies so far delivered at the clinic are girls and believe there is a scientific explanation that they need to research.


TURKEY & SYRIA EARTHQUAKE: Please Contribute

Thought for the Day: We all have them—why not share them.



HAPPY BUCKS: Barbara Reifschneider




BOB SUNDBERG had a bunch of happy and grumpy bucks this morning. Bob has missed many meetings, so he gave 100 bucks to the club for everything.


