Celebrating the Play Structures & Equipment Grant


It was during **Treasurer Vicki Sexton's** 2020-2021 term as President that the Clayton Community Park's playground structures were discovered to be in significant disrepair. This was a perfect opportunity for Rotary to step up and do something about it. It took a very long time to apply for a district grant, but it paid off. Along with donations from three Rotary clubs—Davis, Pleasant Hill, Walnut Creek and the approved grant--\$25,000 was raised. Here are the members and the Mayor posing proudly with the new playground equipment.



Rotary raised \$25,000 to help with funding the re-do of the play structures. The Children's play areas within Clayton Community Park consist of a 2-5 age group section and a 5-12 age group section, each with age-appropriate children's play structures and equipment. Because of wear and tear and general aging (the play area is approximately 15 years old), the City of Clayton will be replacing the 5-12 age group children's play equipment and the rubberized or "resilient" surface in this section. Funding from Prop. 68 will provide about \$170,000 of the estimated \$235,000 project cost.

The remainder will be funded by the City of Clayton and by local community groups. There are 38 components to the children's play structure/equipment; Clayton Valley Concord/Sunrise Rotary Club has committed to the purchase of ten of the thirty-eight

component equipment pieces. All Equipment must be 100% ASTM, CPSC and ADA compliant. Clayton Community Park, located at 7411 Marsh Creek Road, in Clayton, is a 42-acre park that consists of baseball and soccer fields, large and small group covered picnic areas, and two children's areas with play structures and equipment. There are also restrooms, parking areas, open spaces and a trail that connects to the East Bay Regional Park trails system and the Mt. Diablo State Park trails. Clayton Community Park is the largest of the City of Clayton's parks and has a high rate of use by thousands of residents and local community members.



Jody London, Sustainability Coordinator of the of Contra Costa County Climate Action Plan, was our speaker today. She talked about the work being done now to make Contra Costa a cleaner, healthier place to live and work.



Jody is the Sustainability Coordinator for Contra Costa County. Jody's team oversees implementation of the County's Climate Action Plan and serves as staff to the Sustainability Committee of the Board of Supervisors and the Sustainability Commission, a citizen advisory board. Prior to joining Contra Costa County, Jody worked as a consultant to local governments and non-profit organizations on energy issues, in which role she helped form the Local Government Sustainable Energy Coalition and the Regional Energy Networks. Her experience includes six years on the staff of the California Public Utilities Commission and working with the U.S. EPA in the Superfund program. Jody's community service includes 12 years on the Oakland School Board, an elected position. She has a BA in English from UC Berkeley and a Master of Public Administration from Columbia University.




