
# MORNINGRITUALS

# THE**SPEAKER**

This morning **Larry Toy**, past president of Lamorinda Village and former chief executive officer of the Foundation for California Community Colleges, presented an amazing lecture with photos of our galaxy and the brilliant people who made their information and inventions available to us.

Here are a few of the slides and a comment from Torsten Jacobsen during the question portion of the presentation.







This is what Torsten had to say at the end of the speakers presentation: "*My question is based on discussions during a series of astronomy lectures at the Chabot Space and Science Center. Though one fully understands the great fascination and curiosity of space exploration and its many rewards, the point was brought up that this comes at a truly astronomical cost, for example, the astronomical costs of the James Webb project and* landing attempts on other planets such as moon or mars done in large part for international political prestige. *While at the same time we are not spending what is needed down here on earth to rapidly preserve this planet including even our oceans which according to one of America's most famous oceanographers Sylvia Earle there are large areas of ocean bottoms that have yet to be explored and more critically while the oceans account for about 60% of our oxygen, the microbiomes of oceans that are the ultimate sources of ocean life and ours are undergoing critical change. A dilemma of resources for sciences down through the ages which our speaker fully understood. .Regarding comprehending infinity our speaker correctly expressed that certain parameters of our osmos are beyond human comprehension and infinity is only one of them.*"



### About the Speaker


Larry Toy was president of Lamorinda Village from 2019-22. The last decade of his career was as the founding President/CEO of the Foundation for California Community Colleges, the statewide foundation supporting the over 100 community colleges and 2,000,000 students in California. Prior to that he was a professor of astronomy at Chabot College for 28 years. Larry served on the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges and served as Board president. He served on the California Council of Science and Technology, and was a founding member of the Chabot Space and Science Center Board, in Oakland, CA. He has a Bachelor's Degree from Harvard, Master's and PhD from the University of California, Berkeley, all in astronomy.

**Bob Huck** The Home Team will be every other month. The next one is September 30.



**Ambassador Larry Hutchings** reported that the Charitable Fund Board met on Wednesday and the ratified the bylaws for the new nonprofit corporation Cars 2<sup>nd</sup> Chance, Inc. It also received extensive financial and investment reports from Renee and John. At the next meeting the board will be considering a proposal that a percentage of any future donations, except restricted funds, be set aside for the investment account, in order to build up the corpus. In addition, it will consider whether to change the investment strategy going forward. He also reported the Julia Kitay donated \$1,500 to Uganda of which one-thousand will go to the salary of one worker and five hundred for nets.

Larry also reported that Julia is donating 500 boxes of colored pencils and 500 erasers to the Art in a Box project.




**BLUE MOON**
