3. Old Business

a. Dues Increase Discussion

- i. \$180 Hard costs and we charge \$145
- ii. Comment from some members is that why raise dues when we have significant reserves
- iii. Reserves could last 4 years based on typical annual spending
- iv. It was explained that the extra money we typically receive such as meal cost excess, happy bucks and club recognition easily cover operating costs
- v. Recommendation is that we put together a sub committee that can develop a budget philosophy, what circumstances would require a dues increase, and how we should spend reserves.
- vi. Al made a motion not raise dues at this time. 2nd: Wayne. Motion passed unanimously 10-0
- vii. Wayne made a motion to develop a budgetary Policy Committee to develop a budget philosophy, what circumstances would require a dues increase, and how we should spend reserves. 2nd: Al. Motion passed unanimously 10-0

b. Video recording of meetings

- i. Al presented feedback from members. See attached. Not many members responded. Main concerns were
 - 1. Need speakers consent.
 - 2. How much time to make, edit and post and who would do it



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- 3. Will the presenter views the presentation is their copyright?
- 4. Should presenter provide it rather than we record it
- 5. Most stated they did not want the entire meeting recorded.
- 6. Clubs that recorded the entire meeting had fewer viewers
- ii. If the presentation were submitted by the presenter, it would address many of the concerns and we could easily upload to our site.
- iii. Recording is not difficult but moving and downloading takes time.
- iv. A presenter submitted presentation would not have any questions
- v. Do we have the talent, member participation, equipment, and skills to do this well?
- vi. Where would video be stored.
- vii. What is the value of going through all this effort?
- viii. A statement was made that we do not have enough information to decide. It was suggested that to continue discussion we need to have a presentation or proposal submitted to the Board that addresses all the concerns (effort, skills, volunteers, storage, and value)
- ix. Ramon said he would put together a committee that can develop a proposal to bring in front of the Board. Wayne, Beja and Robyn M all volunteered to be on this committee.

4. New Business

a. Consideration for COVID Relief Fund money

- i. \$1,139 is left over from earlier fundraising for COVID relief
- **ii.** Dennis M said that he would identify where vaccination sites are and the number of volunteers. Then he would email the Board with this information so we can address supporting these volunteers.

b. Camp Royal - YRYLA

- i. Lynn has volunteered for the YRYLA program and stated that she will be attending a meeting and will gather more information to present to the Board.
- ii. They have a new program for 7th and 8th graders, (8th graders included since they did not have it last year due to COVID)
- iii. The cost to sponsor a student is \$150
- iv. Lynn moved to approve up to \$300 to sponsor 2 students for YRYLA camp. 2nd: Wayne. Motion passed unanimously

c. Grant Project Status

i. Mexico Fire Engine

- **1.** We pledged \$600 to the program
- 2. Program has completed a while ago so it was stated that we need to send the money to the program.

ii. Woodland Scoreboard

1. The program is still alive so it was agreed to leave this pledge open.

iii. Member assistance Funds

- 1. Last year we received a partial refund from district dues. We decided to use it to assist members who may have experienced financial hardship and some of the funds were, in fact, used to pay for the dues of some members.
- **2.** Wayne moved to move the balance into an income account. 2nd: Rich. Motion passed unanimously.

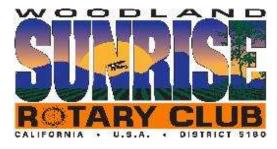


d. Chamber dues renewal

Financial Statement Comments

January 2021

There are two broad categories of expenses: Operating/General Expenses and Donations/Community Service.

The primary giving arm is Woodland Sunrise Foundation, but because it is an entity separate from the club (for tax purposes), the income and expenses are not considered at a Club board meeting except as an aside occasionally.

The primary way the club earns revenue is the weekly activities such as the meal upcharge of \$2.00, the raffle, missed meetings, happy dollars and recognition. The fair beer booth is also a fundraiser for the club. Of course, this year much of that income is not available. The good news is that recognition and voluntary contributions are exceeding budgeted expectations.

The biggest operating expense of the club is the dues paid to RI and the District. Both are paid in full, so there will be no more dues expense for this Rotary year.

There are some obvious differences between the budget and the YTD expenses. One example is the estimated bank fees. It appears that the budgeted amount is about \$1,000 too much. The other large variance item is the budget for PETS. Because it is virtual, the cost is only \$125. [Note: The RI convention is cancelled again and will be virtual. The cost will be low.]
