The Meeting was called to order at 7:06 a.m. by President Tim Swanson in the Boardroom of the Stoughton Davidson Accountancy Corporation at 2520 West Shaw Lane, Suite 101, Fresno, California 93711.

*Approval Of Agenda:

President Tim added the topic of "Youth Exchange" to our discussion items. It was MSC to approve the Agenda, as amended.

*Approval Of Minutes:

It was MSC to approve the Minutes of the 27 August 2008 Board Meetings.

*President's Time:

(Tim Swanson)

Tim shared at last Friday's Meeting that there will be no formal lunch Meeting at TorNino's on 10 October; our Retreat begins that day and continues to Sunday. We will have a Member Sign-In at TorNino's that Friday, to accommodate those Fig Garden Rotarians who will not be up the hill. Secretary Doug Cords to provide Tiffany at TorNino's with this paperwork, to accompany our "Visiting Rotarians' Sign-In" sheet.

Sherry Forath shared that the District is now working on a computer program update and that she is participating in that function and hopes that we as a Club can have our Minutes on our website, password-protected.

An extensive, continued discussion ensued regarding Membership, following last month's topic. A "Meet and Greet" has been successfully utilized by other Clubs. It is a little party, by invitation, to inform prospective Rotarians of our Club and Rotary International. Past President Bill Robinson shared that, during his Presidency, this topic was discussed by the Board and was declined unanimously. Past President Judy Case shared more insights into this type of event and she and Bill, if the Board desires, will work with Club Service Directors on a possible format. This type of event is different in concept that our "traditional" new Member recruiting.

It was MSC that the Board supports this "Meet and Greet" format. It is vital that our membership take this seriously and put forth quality names for it to succeed.

Further discussion ensued, following last month's topic, regarding the "Non-Eaters' Fee" charged. Treasurer Scott Bristol shared that it is the President's role to negotiate costs with TorNino's. President Tim will review this with the banquet hall's staff and report back to the Board.

Past President Marty Dietz led a discussion on our Youth Exchange Program. He shared that our Exchange Student's first month was excellent, with many Members getting involved. We still need two more Host Families for this year.

The Board reviewed in depth the Exchange Program, as a decision must be made by 26 September if we are to participate next year. Kurt Zumwalt and Marty are willing to again perform their respective roles for Sasan's year, should the Board decide to move forward.

The August Hioco Family and the Bill Robinson Family will host a student next year, with the requirement that our participant be female; the Robinsons wish for her to attend Clovis West High School, due to logistics.

The discussion centered around our past Club experience and the need, going forward, to do this project with excellence, or not at all. Having two probable Host Families on board early-on was seen as a positive sign.

It was MSC to approve our Club participating next year in the Exchange Student Program. Bill Robinson noted that an emerging young leader has been identified already as a prospective Outbound Student, from San Joaquin Memorial High School.

It was MSC to approve the Treasurer's Report, as presented.

*Secretary's Report:

Per Board decision, Wendy Cords purchased two Fig Garden Village Gift Certificates, in the amount of \$75.00 each, for Scott Bristol to present to his two hard-working Associates who host our Meetings each month. He reported their delight and appreciation.

Jean Shore, owner of the Fig Garden Bookstore, gives us a substantial discount on our books which are purchased at her place of business; as well, this year, she donated five Gift Certificates to add to those we purchased. The Cords sent her a Fig Garden Rotary Club thank-you letter.

Brad Majors, our Club Member from County Bank, has asked for a formal resolution to update signatures as authorized by the Club.

It was MSC to remove Bill Robinson and Phil Setrakian from the authorized signators and to add Tim Swanson and Sasan Rahmatian to the list. Secretary to provide copies of these Minutes to Brad for his files; he will update the Signature Cards appropriately, with Tim and Sasan.

Discussion ensued regarding the costs of the Host Families with our Exchange Program. It was MSC to add to our Club's costs the amount of \$150.00 each month, payable to the Host Family, to help defray costs.

The Board has dealt with attendance issues of late, a potential source of conflict and personal feelings upset. It was MSC to again participate in the "Helmets Are Cool" program at \$3,000, an amount reduced from the Committee's recommendation, as the Directors do not desire to be an annual funder of programs in large amounts.

It was MSC to again partner with the Trauma Intervention Program, this year in the amount of \$1,558.50 for an update and reprint of their communications brochure.

It was MSC to again participate in the "Burn Aware" Program in the amount of \$1,560.53.

It was MSC to participate with Focus Forward, a program for Foster Children, in the amount of \$1,050.00.

It was MSC to again continue the wonderfully successful "Bicycle Attendance Program" in the amount of \$2,500.00.

ROTARY CLUB OF KITWE - AGRICULTURAL PROJECT PROPOSAL

1. Description of the project

The purpose of the project is to increased food security and nutrition to vulnerable people who are overburden by looking after Children who have been orphaned due to the HIV/AIDS epidemic. The project will be focusing on household economic empowerment in agriculture training and production as opposed to the current practice of giving food aid or donations.

2. Location

The project will be located at Malembeka Farm, a piece of land located near the target areas of Kakolo, Kamfinsa and Luangwa Villages in Kitwe District, Zambia, Central Africa.

3. Needs assessment vis-a-vis the budget - i.e., why is each item needed?

Item Activity

Purpose or Need met

- 1 Infrastructure Development- Training& Food Production Structures
- 2 Support to 100 Household- Farming Skills, income security and Self reliant
- 3 Direct Food Production Farm sustainability & income generation for expansion of farm & program

4. People involved

The project will initially involve 100 targeted households (600 people) coming from three rural communities near the farm site. These households will receive training in farming practices, seed and tools to grow food and generate additional income. The 100 households directly targeted in this project will be involved in every stage of the development of the farm including clearing the land, planting, weeding, harvesting and looking after the livestock. This involvement of 100 households will provide solid practical experience of the farming and transfer the acquired skills to other households in the wider community.

5. Goals

This project is specifically designed to meet the needs of three disadvantaged groups in those selected communities:

- 1) women headed households caring for orphans and for orphans and People Living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA): already overstretched with limited options for accessing income and food and face immense difficulties in supporting themselves and their dependents;
- 2) vulnerable children headed households: who are often at risk of malnutrition, disease and discrimination due to a lack of parental care;
- 3) orphans, other vulnerable children and PLWHA who rely on the community and have limited income capabilities, increased medical costs and increased nutritional requirements.

6. Timetable

The project is expected to run for 18 to 24 months from receipt of the funds. However, this being an on-going process, quarterly review meetings, mid term review and an annual review process will be undertaken involving the beneficiaries and other key local stakeholders before the project is finally handed over.

7. Rotary partners and role of Kitwe Rotary Club

- To do an impact assessment of the project
- Provide funding as outlined in the Budget through the MG
- Ensure the participation of all Rotarians
- Monitor and evaluate the project
- Ensure that the project meets the intended goals or needs.

8. Assessment

An assessment has been done revealing that this project will benefit an initial 600 people in 100 households, the majority of which are child headed or female-headed households caring for orphans and people living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA). They will directly benefit from this project through engagement in training on farming practices and receipt of inputs such as seed and tools. In addition, over 500 household members including orphans and other vulnerable children and PLWHA will also benefit from the project through increased food security and income of the household and involvement in health and nutrition education activities.

9. Sustainability

At the end of the project the beneficiaries will increase their self-sustainability. This will be manifested through additional income, increased food production, improved access to a diverse diet suiting specific needs of PLWH, and nutritional education knowledge that is replicated into the wider communities. As for the Farm it will be further developed into a local centre benefiting those communities.

- (1) At the end of the grant period the food and income security of the targeted households will be strengthened in the longer term through the transfer of skills learned during training and Input of tools and seeds to grow food at household level for both household consumption and to generate income.
- (2) As part of the training, beneficiaries will also participate in a session on the training of trainers, which will provide skills in coaching and training others. Those who benefit from this project will then be able to train other members within their community in farming techniques and animal husbandry, as well as support ongoing CINDI efforts to raise awareness of the importance of good health and nutrition practices particularly for PLWHA.
- (3) The vision for Malembeka farm is to develop it into a training and production centre for local farmers in food production, farming, animal husbandry and health and nutrition education. This initial funding will provide a strong foundation to this vision, through the project activities, the building of the training structures and the purchase of inputs .In addition, during the grant period, the farm will develop an income generating strategy in order to expand further the activities at the farm in the coming years.

Executive Director Project Location George Chiyeke Kitwe – Copperbelt.

CINDI-Kitwe is a Non-denominational, Non -Governmental Organisation established in 1994 with the purpose of contributing to the well being of children orphaned by HIV/AIDS through care and support. CINDI-Kitwe was set up with an objective of providing positive prevention, care and support to the affected households with orphans and people living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA). The organisation is currently working in 11 townships of Kitwe district reaching approximately 300 households in each township with an average of 4 orphans each.

At inception, the organisation focussed on general welfare provision that included food aid and education support to orphans delivered through a network of volunteers that formed leadership structures within the 12 CINDI catchment areas. Since 2003, CINDI Kitwe has shifted focus from food aid to household economic empowerment activities for more sustainable poverty reduction in communities while continuing the education project. HIV/AIDS prevention activities were also initiated at this stage.

Since 2006, the organisation has began strengthening the leadership structures to the level of Community Based Organisations (CBOs) to help develop local sustainable strategies towards community empowerment, leadership and governance for improved service provision to orphans and caregivers. This is to strengthen the capacity of communities to drive their own development activities through full engagement and understanding in planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation. CINDI Kitwe has since developed a capacity building strategy for all CBOs formed with an initial target of four communities.
