Program: Club Assembly Featuring President Buff Wright

The purpose of a Club Assembly is to provide a platform for the new president to present the leadership team, the budget and her objectives for the coming year. In order to provide relevant context, let us begin at the beginning: Buff was born in Lisbon, Portugal, to missionary parents. [For the rest of this story, see her Sr. Craft Talk. [8/2/19 <u>Clarifier</u>] Flashing forward, today, Buff is retired from higher education administration, and is an aspiring Zoom master. She's the mother of Matthew (fiancée Shannon) and Sarah (husband Andrew) and grandmother of Leo (5/7/20), and stepmother to Heather (husband Vince they have three teenage boys).

President Buff took a few minutes to review the successes of President Cameron Troxell's year, including a Gold Patch for Uniting People, a Gold Patch for Taking Action, a Platinum Governor Distinction Patch, a RI Rotary Citation with Platinum RI President's Distinction, and we are in contention for the District Governor's Bell. We funded local groups such as a new Scout troop, held the Bikes for Kids celebration in December, Together We Prepare at El Roble in February, and a Rotary Work Day at Hope Partners. We sent members to two peace conferences, both District and International. We advanced fellowship activities under the leadership of Susie Ilsley and Nona Tirre, who organized networking events at Taste of Claremont vendor locations. We celebrated our 90th Anniversary as well as our usual fall social and an event in March just before social distancing entered our lexicon. Despite the

disruption, we have been able to fund scholarships and Hope Partners.



Our 2020-2021 Founda-

tion budget is funded by the 2019 Taste of Claremont. (A Courier <u>video from TOC 2019</u> was cued up but refused to play for the meeting-A Taste of Tulac? Maybe, as a random You Tube item then started to play on audio.) OK, order restored. How do we keep doing the important work we are known for?

It starts with the Leadership Team, including Directors Nona Tirre (2021), Mike DeWees (2021), Chris Shaner (2022), Lark Gerry (2022), Susie Ilsley (2023), and Jerry Goldman (2023), along with President Buff, Presidentelect Mark Carson (Secretary), President-elect-elect Jim Marchant (Treasurer), Immediate Past-President Cameron Troxell and Past President Ron Coleman (through December 31—then our new PEEE joins the team as Treasurer). This policy team is augmented by the Management Committee, which oversees fundraising and grants, membership development, public relations, community and youth activities, club meetings, and operations. The Management Committee includes John Tulac as Foundation Chair, overseeing District and RI

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grants and projects and donations to our local Rotary Foundation and to RI Foundation. Harry Sparrow, whose consulting career has dealt with development of people, is Member Development Chair, and will be paying special attention to engaging members, new ones in particular, in leadership development opportunities within Rotary. Lyn Childress chairs Community Service, with a goal of at least four projects for the year (and one—the Thompson Creek Trail benches—is on its way to completion!) in a year where face to face interaction will be severely restricted. She has taken on a challenging task! Youth and Scholarships is chaired by **Paul Steffen**, who will be coordinating with Lyn to engage students in the larger enterprise of Rotary service. Nona Tirre, also a Director, is Public Image chair, building on her fine work of the recent past. Karen Sapio chairs Administration, and will focus on inclusiveness and engagement.


RI, for its part, has a five-year plan for us to 1) increase our impact—it's all local, so what are local needs, and how can we help meet them. 2) Expand our reach—work with community organizations and with other Rotary clubs nearby and abroad. 3) Enhance participant engagement—inspire members and support them as they do the work. 4) Increase our ability to adapt—we have made a good start this year, and will be tested throughout the next.

Everyone's interested in what we do with the money— Budgets! We have two separate budgets, one for Operations, funded from our quarterly dues, and one for Foundation, funded by Taste of Claremont and by quarterly giving. Under Operations, we fund supplies and materials, accounting and legal, public relations and media, District meetings and the travel to the RI Convention for the President-elect and District Conference for the President. We also pay RI dues and District dues for all members. Normally, Operations subsidizes a portion of the meeting cost when we have lunch meetings and social events,

The Foundation Budget: quarterly giving generates, at current giving patterns, about \$13,000 for RI Foundation, about \$1400 for Polio Plus, and about \$10,000 for local Claremont Rotary Foundation-supported projects.

Total **local** Foundation revenue for 2020-2021 looks pretty solid. We have \$57,075 from TOC 2019, \$9750 from member giving, \$6000 (est.) from District grants, and \$2870 from Bikes for Kids carryover from last year.

If we collectively gave at the recommended level for **local** giving, receipts for the Claremont Rotary Foundation would be closer to \$17,000. It's something to think about, especially as the Taste of Claremont, our largest source of local



funding (the orange area), is on hold for 2021-22.

Now where does all this funding go? We have a long list of recipient organizations from last year, many of which we have been supporting over a number of years. This year we will be asking each to submit proposals for what they'd like us to fund. And the Board will assess priorities before making commitments. Member input will be welcome, and Buff will probably conduct some club polling along the way to get a feel for what the membership wants to do. This same scrutiny will extend to our district and international projects. We have an opportunity to think carefully about how we want to focus our efforts and resources. What will be our best impact on our community? What do we want to be known for?

The Claremont Lions Club (now defunct) was known for providing glasses to people around the world. We know Kiwanis for their griddles and pancakes and hot dogs and burgers, and we have an idea that they support local charitable enterprises like we do, but can we name them? For that matter, can folks name our areas of impact? This year we'll have clubs like Kiwanis come speak to us about what they're doing, which can help inform where we choose to engage.

Buff's superpower is education, policy, and administration. She hopes to have all hands on deck as we get under way, but she confesses she's not great at delegating, so let's help her—take it on, run with it, make it happen. What do you want from Rotary? What inspires you? How will you participate and contribute?

Buff came in for the fellowship, drawn in by her cosponsors, Bernadette Kendall and Jim Lehman. She was intrigued by Corazon Build after talking to Paul Steffen,
