

# **Program: Rebecca Ustrell, Curious Publications**



Our speaker, Rebecca Ustrell was introduced by Sarah Jo Antonucci. Sarah Jo said that Rebecca is not only a well known artist from the inland empire community, but she is also involved in many community service

projects in the area. They met at a Chamber event.

Here is the deep dive background on Rebecca. She is the founder and Editor in Chief of Curious Publishing. Curious Publishing was established to promote and nurture the underrepresented and under-serviced talents of the Inland Empire, Los Angeles and Greater Southern California. Through her experience in coordinating the Claremont Art Walk Pop-Up Gallery from 2016-2018, she decided to highlight the many talented artists in her first indie publication CURIOUS Magazine in September 2018. Since then, CP has published a new edition of CURIOUS every quarter with a new theme and focus per issue. In addition to CURI-OUS Magazine, Curious Publishing also publishes a biannual lifestyle and culture journal entitled Mise en Abyme; Curious also acts as a consultant and publisher for independent artist publications for artists throughout Southern California. Becky's involvement in the arts extends through several collaborations in the Inland Empire. She sits on the board of The Artlands, and serves as a volunteer Special Events Coordinator for The Arts Area. These projects are all in addition to her solo career as a visual artist and creative writer.

Rebecca goes by Becky. She became Becky a few years ago when she first started her fundraising career at the Children's Foundation, where there was already another Rebecca. "Becky" was perfect, because it is also a family nickname.

Becky said that she is an independent artist. She does custom pet pictures as well as portraits of people. Sarah Jo and Vadim commissioned Becky to paint a custom picture of them and their dog. She said that this is one of a limited number of "handmade" versions of her art. She is now working in digital format. Becky shared a couple of her most recent digital pictures.



# **African continent declared Polio Free!**

This progress is the result of a decades-long effort across the 47 countries of the African region. It has involved millions of health workers traveling by foot, boat, bike and bus, innovative strategies to vaccinate children amid conflict and insecurity, and a huge disease surveillance network to test cases of paralysis and check sewage for the virus. This milestone is an incredible public health achievement for Rotary members, the African region, and our GPEI partners, and a huge step forward on the road to global polio eradication. But we still have important work to do in order to eradicate wild polio in the last two endemic countries.

We have faced many challenges in our journey to eradicate polio. But we've made remarkable progress, and the polio infrastructure that Rotarians helped build will serve as a lasting legacy that will continue to help protect vulnerable children against other diseases for decades to come. We are calling on you today to recommit yourselves to ending polio. We need each and every one of you to help finish this fight and continue raising \$50 million each year for PolioPlus. The eradication of wild polio in the African region shows us that polio eradication is achievable, and shows how our hard work, partnerships and financial commitment continue to propel us forward, even during a global pandemic.

# **Board meeting August 18**

The Board of Directors has adopted a basic operating budget for 2020-2021. While we are certain to fund a number of programs without proposals, like RYLA if it is held, the board noted that most other local organizations that we have traditionally funded, must now submit a proposal for consideration for funds. We put approximately \$35,000 in an active contingency fund for everything else. With careful planning we should be able to maintain an acceptable level of service to our community for the next two to three years, prudence made necessary due to the Covid 19 pandemic that is impacting our fundraising. Ron Coleman and his committee, Mike DeWees and Nona Tirre have presented a related policy for spending the related foundation reserves. Finally, our budget is built largely on our current level of donations to our Foundation. We are all saving some money by virtue or curse of our lunch-free

Her art book company, Curious Publishing, is sponsored fiscally by the <u>Inland Empire Arts Area</u> which is an art-based non-profit that specializes in boosting startups in the arts. In fact, Curious Publishing was the first project that the Arts Area undertook. She has been publishing for about two years. Becky pointed out some recent publications on a book rack behind her. They included a copy of Curious magazine, an art book and another independent title publication called *Pandemic*, which includes about 90 pages of artwork, including some by her sister, Bianca.

As we could see, Becky is a woman who wears many hats. She used to be very involved with fundraising for foster children throughout the Inland Empire via Children's

Foundation of America. This led to her involvement with Claremont Emerging Leaders (nee Young Professionals) where she eventually became the chair. Through activities there she met people associated with Claremont Art Walk which is how she first became involved with the art scene and was introduced to Claremont.

Becky is also very engaged with Ontario Art Walk. She gathers artists for this and is involved in hanging the artwork in the gallery and Casa Pitzer. This event is another one that is associated with The Arts Area.



Since Curious Publishing began, it has been focused on raising funds which are put back into the printing costs and paying artists who appear in the publication. She said that the books and magazine focus on subjects like social justice and other issues that are relevant to the community, especially in the Inland Empire. The one hard and fast rule is that a minimum of 80 percent of what they publish is connected to artists living in the Inland Empire. All of the work is done by volunteers.

As is the case with so many of us, Becky's endeavors have been affected by Covid-19. Pre-Covid, she was involved with

quarterly release parties, live music and art shows which often had over 200 attendees. Now she is involved with online art parties where they do a weeklong promotion of artists and their works. She is also doing a lot of Instagram Live work.

In June, Becky suffered as terrible loss of publications, n as well as household contents, due to a fire in the house where CP was located. She is working to rebuild her library and it is currently about fifty percent recompiled. This effort requires financial resources. To support that she has established a Fire Relief Auction to which more than 40 local artists volunteered works. Her goal is to raise \$5000. The prices of art and sculpture range from \$15 to several hundred. Information about the fundraiser can be found at the <a href="Curious website">Curious website</a>. She is grateful for the generosity of the community to CP and to her personally.

After Becky finished her presentation, PDG Randy Pote was inspired to suggest a special program related to arts for elementary school age kids that our club and Becky could work on together. Pote noted several ways that such a joint effort could work, perhaps as a vocational project where we talk to kids about careers in the arts, offering drive through art shows, or an introduction of young artists' work into the curriculum. Becky said that she has experience related to this idea. She and **Sarah Jo** both talked about these experiences. Becky said that she has been invited to do shows like this and affirmed that she knows of others doing drive through art shows. President Buff explained that our club is focused on how to best serve our community during the pandemic and we would think through how this might translate to a club service project at this time.

The ideas kept coming. Sarah suggested that Becky, using the digital medium, could create a "this is Rotary" coloring book. It could describe the service mission of Rotary and include important components like the 4-Way Test. The book could incorporate both art and reading skills. **Sylvia Whitlock** suggested that it could include a component where the children actually illustrate their interpretation of each of the four tests. Randy volunteered that he has a book about the 4-way test that he could provide to Becky and Sarah Jo as a starting point.

**Bridget Healy** asked, since both Becky and her sister were artists, whether that talent runs in the family. Becky said that her parents are both creative people. Her mom is a singer and loves to draw and collect art. Her father enjoys calligraphy and drawing.
