## Program: CUSD School Board Candidate Forum

Ballots were mailed out in the first week of October, and for just in time programming, today's program is a forum with the three candidates for Claremont Unified School District School Board. There are three well qualified candidates and two seats. In Claremont we have so many good citizens willing to step forward, typically the city wins no matter who is elected.

Each candidate was given two minutes to introduce themselves. Then in the interest of zoom efficiency, President Buff asked each candidate questions submitted by members.

Candidates **Kathy Archer, Bob Fass** and **Chris Naticchia** Started with a brief introduction of themselves.

Chris said he is a twenty-five-year Claremont resident. He is a California State University San Bernardino professor of philosophy. In terms of public service, he has served on the Claremont Unified School District's parent advisory committee for the Local Control Accountability Plan and he is a city commissioner. Chris is a parent of a student entering Claremont High School this year, and is active in the Claremont community.

Bob is a Claremont native and an alumnus of Claremont public schools; he attended Sycamore School, El Roble and Claremont High School and now is a proud CUSD parent. He also works in Claremont. In terms of public service, he has worked with the Claremont Educational

A week or so ago, RI President Jennifer Jones and Past RI President (PRIP) John Germ, Polio plus chair Mike McGovern, and others hosted a World End Polio Now program to update everyone on the need for this big plea. I was in on the call and promised Jennifer that my club and I would not ignore this Purple Pinky Plea (when children receive the Polio inoculation their pinkies are painted purple so that future inoculators can tell if a child has been inoculated). Some of the information from that program was in the [October 2 Clarifier](#).

I am asking that each member make a special donation of \$20, \$30, \$40 or more -

Wherever your heart leads you, or less if you are not able - even \$1 can get a child inoculated!

I am looking for 100% participation from this club. I know you care. Like Malala, let's put it out there! Mail your check, marked End Polio Now, to Jim Marchant or to Buff Wright, or email me and I will pick it up. We would like to have this done so that on October 24th - World Polio Day, we will be able to tally the donations and share the Club's accomplishment with Jennifer Jones. Ask your Mom! Ask your Interactors. Ask everyone you know. The cause is important. How much more important could the cause be if you can save the life of one child? The pandemic is creating huge problems. We need to do this now!

I would appreciate if you would respond and let me know how you will respond. Please do not ignore the children whose lives and well-being depend on this. I thank you and they thank you and the world thanks you.

Unified School District, attending Condit, El Roble and now Claremont High School. Kathy has served on the Claremont Educational Foundation Board of Directors since 2016 and was a member of the successful Claremont Measure G bond campaign in 2016. She has been a teacher at Charter Oak High School in Covina since 1998. Kathy teaches World History, World History Honors, IB (International Baccalaureate) History of the Americas and serves as the IB and AP Coordinator. While at Charter Oak she has served as Leadership Chair, Department Chair, District Technology Committee Member and WASC Accreditation Chair.

Each of the candidates had succinct answers to their priorities for CSUD.

Bob describes his priorities as:

- Health and safety of the students and the teachers and staff who support them
- Responsible management of taxpayer dollars and advocacy for increased public school funding
- Academic success for students of all identities, backgrounds, and abilities
- Equity and inclusion is essential

Kathy outlined her priorities as:

- Educational Equity - All students should have the access and support they need to achieve individual academic success.
- Fiscal Responsibility - Thoughtful planning and decisive decision-making regarding programs, people, facilities and materials while being mindful of increasing budget challenges.
- Safety and Wellness: Address campus safety concerns, student wellness, responsible use of technology, and the need for safe and modern facilities.

Chris said that his priorities are:

- Bolster support for student social, emotional, and mental health
- Strengthen critical thinking
- Address student equity issues
- Engagement of parents

Over the course of the program each shared their vi-



sion for serving on and contributing to the CUSD.

Kathy talked about her vision by starting with immediate issues that are facing the district. She said these include distance learning, educational equity, a budget crisis, a recent ransomware attack, and declining enrollment are simultaneously impacting students, staff, teachers, and families alike. Kathy said that as challenging as these times are, they will not last forever. She wants to serve the Claremont community as a school board member who helps the district move forward. Specifically, her vision is to actively participate in strengthening the best of CUSD programs and policies and work together to find solutions to challenges that have grown out of the COVID-19 pandemic. She said that the only way to accomplish

this in the best interests of students and staff, is for all stakeholders to work together towards common goals that are set through continuous and transparent dialogue.

Chris describes his vision by talking about the accomplishments of his father as a public school teacher and principal. He said that he wants to build on his father's legacy by use of his own experience in public education to stand up and speak up for Claremont students. Chris said that to him public education is a public trust. Yet it faces a constant struggle for resources to keep pace with need. While private fundraising closes some of this gap, locally it represents just one-fifth of one percent of an \$82 million annual budget. Public education requires public support.

Bob's vision is built around the priorities that he outlined above. In addition to those he added advocating for increased public-school funding, further enhancement of the district's positive relationship with parents, stressing teaching excellence, ensuring necessary levels of support services and continued professional development. Bob said that CUSD is fortunate to have a track record of stability and a supportive community that has demonstrated a commitment to invest in capital needs and infrastructure. Building on the success and progress of recent years, he intends to strengthen those relationships and provide continuity through collaboration and thoughtful governance.

Welcome CHS Interactors, who introduced themselves.




