Program: Political Risk and the Future of Business: Prof. Ian Oxnevad

S.J. Antonucci introduced Dr. Ian Oxnevad, a visiting Professor of Political Science at UC Irvine. Dr. Oxnevad holds a PhD in political science from the University of California-Riverside, a BA in Arabic and a

MA in National Security Studies. He was a 2014 recipient of the US Department of State's Critical Language Scholarship for Turkish. Dr. Oxnevad regularly publishes peer-reviewed work on issues of security, political economy, and the Middle East.

As a political scientist and political economist, Dr. Oxnevad's research focuses in areas where security and the economy overlap. His work examines issues of threat finance, terrorist financing, and geoeconomics, as well as broader geopolitical dynamics impacting the modern world. He got to these studies from "threat financing."

His expertise regarding unstable countries and the accompanying economic and political risk can be applied to businesses in the US today. In other words, they probably should have seen it coming.

Dr. Oxnevad gave us some background on the differences between political science and history and the subfield of political economy and how politics and economics are not sep-

arate; market and non-market influence each other.



He related the past to our current situation by pointing out that the Black Death in 1347 came along the economic trade routes between China and Italy. For American businesses this is an old-new world.

Today we are seeing China re-establishing the Belt and Road Initiative to refit the global economy around Eurasia tied primarily to China. We know from a prior presentation on global supply chain that we are tied to the world and a war in the Middle East can drive up gas prices and affect even a small business like a food truck here in Los Angeles.

But many businesses still don't perceive themselves as living in a political environment despite political polarization that are at all-time highs, regulatory changes, taxation and even talk of nationalizing entire industries.

So how do businesses survive this chaos? All businesses should see themselves as political actors and develop a political mindset that incorporates political and economic intelligence into their operations.

Dr. Oxnevad talked about a 108 year old mineral water company called Uludag that he studied (after buying some) while he was living in Turkey. This company has survived the Ottoman coup, WW1, foreign occupation, war of independence, modernization, authoritarianism, five military coups since 1960, ongoing terrorism, massive inflation and high levels of corruption.

There is no reason other businesses cannot survive upheavals. Those that do stay aware of political events going on around them. He mentioned that he's studied Somalia and

their economy has actually improved even though the central government has collapsed. Though it is a failed state, Somalians actually export more meat to the Middle East and North Africa than Australia does.

What political awareness takes is intelligence, collective evaluation analysis and synthesis of different information. We often think of spies and stealing trade secrets, but businesses can do this with relevant information that is publicly available. Looking at indicators like the fact that China owns most of the minerals we need to have a green economy, drives a conclusion that as we head in that direction, we are going to butt heads with China.



Business intelligence is really no different in the sense that you're still looking at actors and environments and non-economic data. He gave several examples of non-market pressures on businesses. Small businesses can often find help uncovering this data through business associations and Chambers of Commerce whereas larger businesses do this on their own.

Do watch the recording if you didn't hear Dr. Oxnevad live, as he had some very interesting slides (It's hard to read them here) and he really put things in perspective. We'll invite him to speak again!

Volunteers needed for Aging Next Food Delivery

Stacy Middlestaedt of Aging Next offered up opportunities for Rotarians to volunteer. Aging Next is the local coordinator for AmeriCorps, a national volunteer service organization. Aging Next is also coordinator for the retired senior volunteer program and the senior companion program. They partner with Meals on Wheels in Claremont and surrounding communities, and with Claremont Manor, Pilgrim Place, the City of Claremont, City of La Verne, City of Diamond Bar. So people interested in volunteering can come to Aging Next and find a range of opportunities.

Meal delivery. Right now, we're delivering all of the meals for the City of Claremont. Senior centers are closed all over and most people have to drive to get to the meal delivery site, but of course some seniors can't drive. They will likely need help in the weeks ahead as college students are unavailable. They would like to get a handful of Rotarians to sign up to be a substitute meal delivery driver. It takes about an hour on Monday and/or Wednesday, and is contactless—the meals are in bags and put in the back of your car, and you put them on the client's porch, ring the bell, step back and wait for them to open. You deliver to 4 or 5 addresses.

The <u>Senior Companion Program</u> is a national program of volunteers doing in-home visits, running errands for them, have lunch or play games together, in the process building friendships. Volunteers who are low income seniors. Are paid a stipend and mileage through an AmeriCorps grant. It could provide anywhere from \$60 to a couple hundred dollars a month, and for the volunteers it can mean groceries, a utility bill, part of the rent. They would like Rotarians to be ambassadors and get the word out for the future. There is no inhome volunteering now due to COVID.

Ride and Go, which matches a volunteer with a senior who needs a ride. It's inactive right now, but consider it for the future. This is in addition to Dial a Ride and Get About, and provides door-to-door assistance.
