# **Program:** Fixing Education with MiddleTree—Joe Atman, PhD<sup>2</sup>

**Sarah Jo Antonucci** introduced Joe Atman who she met while volunteering at <u>MiddleTree</u>. Joe is eager to share his perspectives about the education system. He began by noting that MiddleTree is working to address problems in education. MT is a 4 year old non-profit educational center with an audacious mission.

Joe's background inspired his work. He experienced problems making good grades in middle school, which made him feel unintelligent. In his senior year, the teacher in a class on "Religious Quest" noticed Joe and empowered him to be more positive. He actually took Joe to a program at Hofstra University which he thought would be beneficial. Joe finished the program and eventually got a PhD at CGU in Philosophy of Religion and Theology and then another doctorate in theology. He even became president of a Seminary. None of this would have happened without that personal attention.

Joe shared, as contextual background for his insights, the realization that the story of Adam and Eve and the apple is a story of gaining knowledge that makes them fall out of harmony with the world. How does that make sense? Knowledge is good! Joe understands that what they were lacking was context for their new knowledge, a state of being that causes angst!

The structures of our education system mold our minds. Like any system, one risks failure by not meeting the expectations of the system. There are a couple of problems people are aware of. Schools are underfunded and teachers don't have enough of the right tools. This has long term impacts.



And generally speaking, affluent areas have better funding and smaller classes.

The fact is that education is a system, a system that exists to produce a result. Joe contends that learning is a process and not a measurable result. Yet few of us remember what we learned. Learning stuff — memorization and regurgitation — isn't the goal. He maintains that attainment, navigating the system should be the goals: students need to learn for themselves. People who make excellent and creative contributions typically have broken the mold. Charlie Parker, a jazz great, said something like: First you master the instrument and then you do it your way and just play.

Failure is important for learning. If a kid gets something really wrong, we shouldn't just fail them, but ask




Mark Carson reported that the Out on

#### MiddleTree Program, continued from p. 1

what their thinking was and address that.

Joe was careful not to blame teachers or administrators. He has talked to many about how MiddleTree can help. Once you realize the problem, it's apparent that the MiddleTree program can be a part of the solution!

Joe summarized with a description of the three things his non-profit does. MiddleTree provides:

- 1. Equal, affordable access to the program
- 2. Unlimited time available to students
- 3. Individual curriculum for every student. They have worked closely with teachers and parents to get results.

Buff offered up that the chat room was very busy during his talk, all on point. We entertained Questions and Answers and a number of people stayed on to talk well after 1:30.

**Nona Tirre's** kids attend the program and have been very successful. Nona noticed an improvement in their reading and comprehension and organizational skills. Each child is benefitting in a different way in accord with their needs.

Is the System not able to adapt to this concept of education? Change is hard. We base achievement on grades and schedule things at certain times. But ask Michael Jordan if he only practiced when it was on the schedule. Grades and schedules don't work for all. A change in that would require a major restructuring of the day.

How has the pandemic shutdown changed what you do? We've persevered. We're working with Pomona Unified School District, serving 600-1200 students. All the extra support is impactful and still helps on Zoom.

Why are students not as well prepared now in writing, math, etc. ? There's something fundamentally wrong. There's no simple answer. Maybe teachers don't have the time to pay attention at the lower levels.

Are there any volunteer opportunities for Rotarians? Community support is really important. A lot of students need someone to talk to about what they're doing. It would be interesting to explore a support system for parents at this time. Tutors are welcome. Observers are welcome. Family therapists would be useful.

The onsite office is in Claremont on 1st street above the Escape Salon.

MiddleTree serves between 8 and 12 school districts. Participants are asked to contribute what they can. A lot of the students are first generation Americans and first generation English speakers.

Thank you Joe! We've had a couple of weeks of immersion in education issues. It has us all thinking!
