resident's Message...

Our mission is to actively participate in our local and worldwide community through the grants we make each year. We emphasize our belief in the promise and value of youth and education and our commitment to the humanitarian goals of Rotary. This is made possible by you and your fellow Rotarians who support the Denver Rotary Club Foundation (DRCF) through your donations and also by supporting our Club fundraisers. During this year the COVID-19 virus continued to challenge everyone. We Rotarians stepped up to meet the challenges. I am pleased to report that the DRCF had another successful year.

In spite of a spring freeze that devastated the peach crop, Peach Chairs Bryan Guice and Kevin Shelledy found a grower in Paonia, CO and saved the peach sale. Our first spring fundraiser, The April Fools unTalent show was a huge success thanks to our un-organizers Fundraising VP Jill Santuccio, President Debbie Beasley and ED Lauren Mast.

The Grants Committee, chaired by Past DRCF President Jack Green, had a very successful and innovative granting cycle. DRCF granted a total of \$149,150 and we approved four new grantees. Finally our investment portfolio reached \$4 million in value for the first time since 2007.

It has been an honor and privilege so serve as your Foundation President during the past year. I have also been fortunate to have the support of our board of Trustees and Lauren Mast, COO of DRCF. Thank you Club 31 members and friends who have supported DRCF to make this a rewarding and productive year.

MEMBERSHIP

Voting membership in DRCF is open to active Club Rotarians who have made a contribution of at least \$1,000 or made a commitment to donate at least \$100 per year to reach \$1,000, with cumulative Fellow recognition giving levels thereafter. The Legacy Society is open to everyone who makes a planned gift to DRCF.

GOVERANCE

DRCF is governed by a 16-member Board of Trustees. All Trustees, serving staggered terms up to six years, are members of the Rotary Club of Denver. Trustees are nominated by a Nominating Committee consisting of two sitting Trustees, two Club Board of Directors, one at-large Club member appointed the Club President, and one at-large member appointed by the DRCF President. The Board of Trustees currently meets every other month and the Executive Committee of officers meets on the off months.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

The corpus of the Foundation is currently over \$4 million. Sources of revenue include individual contributions, memorial donations, various fundraisers, bequests and investment income. Annual major fundraisers over the years have included the Artist of America Sale and Exhibition, the Branch Rickey Award Dinner, last year's 50th Anniversary and our unTalent Show. The corpus is managed by TIAA and is overseen by the Finance Committee of DRCF.

MISSION **STATEMENT**

The Mission of the Denver Rotary Club Foundation is to participate actively in the diverse life of our community through the grants it makes every year. The Foundation's grants emphasize our belief in the promise and value of youth and education, affirming our commitment to the humanitarian goals of Rotary.

A primary function of DRCF is to award grants every year. The Grants Committee is comprised of nine members who serve staggered three-year terms. There are three members of the DRCF Board of Trustees, three members of the Rotary Club of Denver Board of Directors and three at-large members of the Club. Our thanks to this year's Grants Committee: Trustees Jack Green (Chair), Bill Imig and Mike MacPhail; Directors Melissa Bowen, Jim Johnston and Louise Westfall; At-Large Members Stephanie Foote, Jay Kamlet and Chuck Turner.

Each year, the amount of money available for grants is determined by a preset, complex formula intended to both fund current Club initiatives and build a legacy for future Club projects. The total grant is reliant on member contributions, fundraising activities (like the peach sale, vehicle donations and annual fundraiser) and earnings from Foundation assets.

DRCF makes grants to committees of the Rotary Club of Denver and select nonprofit organizations with substantial hands-on involvement by Rotarians. Formal written grant applications are accepted early in the calendar year, reviewed by the Grants Committee with recommended grant amounts approved by the DRCF Board of Trustees in early April.

Since its inception in 1969, DRCF has granted over \$8 million into our local and international Communities!

In addition to the annual grants DRCF made to the Grantees, DRCF funded a Disaster Relief Fund in the amount of \$5,000; \$2,500 went to COVID-19 Relief and \$2,500 went to the District for Colorado Wildfire Relief. The Denver Century Ride/Woohoomanity Bike Challenge was cancelled due to COVID but the District Clubs stepped up to have our own Rotary Woohoo challenge. We were the second highest fundraising Club in the District and raised a total \$4,562. DRCF sent 1/3 of the funds in the amount of \$1,519 to Polio Plus. Thanks to Jim Goddard, Brian Sweet, Colleen Cozad and her husband, Brad, for joining the Club 31 Woohoo team along with team captain Carter Sales.
