It was founded in 2000.

The organization funds Library programs not covered by tax revenue.

### PLF has successfully funded a variety of initiatives, including:

- Early Math Readiness (helping children from birth to age five build foundational math and reading skills)
- Sahuarita Library Outdoor Performance Patio (a 1,000-square-foot covered venue serving over 30,000 residents)
- Workforce Investment/Development (an innovative program designed to expand employers' approach to workforce development and empower individuals in a changing job market)
- **Code Club** (providing opportunities for learning computer coding)
- **Ready, Set, School!** (offering activities that boost children's executive brain functions and learning skills)
- Homework Help (providing free, personalized tutoring for Pima County learners of all ages)

### **Career Online High School**

- To date, the Pima Library Foundation has funded 130 of the students who have graduated from the Career Online High School program.
- Career Online High School is a nationally accredited high school diploma program for residents of Pima County 22 years and older.
- In addition to earning a high school diploma, students also earn a career certificate in one of ten in-demand career areas.
- The cost of a scholarship is \$1300 per student.

### Mobile Hotspots

- Mobile Hot Spots can be checked out of the Library and provide 24/7 access to the internet with unlimited data on a fast, secure network.
- Hotspots create digital equity by providing access to the internet for people who may not have internet service at home.
- Through the use of Hotspots community members have a way to access online resources like skills training, health information, homework help, and job boards.
- Hotspots cost \$260 each.

### **Scholarships**

- Applicants must be employed by the Pima County Public Library and accepted by the College of Information Science at the University of Arizona as either a full or part time student.
- Though not a requirement, many of those who have received a scholarship in the past have remained in Pima County and have held leadership positions within the system. Among others, these include Amber Mathewson, PCPL's previous Executive Director, and Karyn Prechtel-Altman, former Deputy Director of the Pima County Public Library.

"At the time I received the scholarship, I was a young mother who would never have been able to afford tuition on my own. Thanks to the scholarship I received from the Friends of the Green Valley Library, I graduated from library school in 1995, and that set into motion my career which has culminated in becoming the Director of Pima County Public Libraries.
