Malaria is one of the leading killers of children in Africa. 625,000 people die every year due to malaria. 70% of malaria victims are children under age 5. Malaria is the number one killer of pregnant women in developing countries with tropical climates. Long-lasting, insecticidal nets (LLIN) will prevent many of the 240 million non-fatal cases of malaria that occur every year. Globally 43 million people are blind and 295 million more live with moderate to severe visual impairment. 77% of these cases are completely preventable or treatable. Cataracts, glaucoma, trachoma, and trichiasis are common eye diseases that are treatable and preventable. Blindness is a gender issue: globally there are 112 million more women than men living with vision loss. While some barriers to eye care exist for both genders, lack of education, difficulty accessing finances, and an inability to travel mean that women and girls are disproportionately affected by blindness. The money from those sales helps the farmer to increase acreage, expand into other areas such as hog production, and even to build better homes for his family Training Zambian farmers costs approximately \$20 per farmer.
