2ND ANNUAL HUNGER DRIVE

Hunger is a major issue everywhere in the world. In Missouri, 715,170 people face hunger with 177,320 being children. September is designated as Hunger Action Month by Feeding America to inspire people to act and raise awareness of hunger in the United States. As a district we can make a huge impact on those facing food insecurity throughout 3 state food bank zones (Central Missouri Food Bank, St Louis Food Bank, and Southeast Missouri Food Bank). September 15th is Hunger Action Day and that is when we will begin our 2nd Annual Hunger Drive.

To raise awareness, each club should wear orange and post a photo with #HungerActionDay. For the competition each club will create projects to provide meals to Missourians such as:

- Serve meals at a food kitchen
- Pack/deliver food at a food bank, for a backpack program or senior boxes
- Pack or deliver food in concert with another organization (i.e., Meals on Wheels)
- Provide funds, where appropriate, to collaborate with another local or regional food distributing organization
- Host a virtual food drive with your local food bank

- Host a food drive
 - Each food bank can provide collection barrels or boxes if needed
 - Each club will get with their respective food bank to schedule delivery or to schedule pick up by food bank personnel

Clubs will be awarded "meal points" for volunteer hours, food donations, and dollars donated during the competition period (September 15 - October 31). On 1 November, meal points will be calculated and the club with the most points will receive a gift from the District Governor. So, what counts as a meal?

\$1.00 = 4 meals

1.2 pounds of food donated = 1 meal

1 volunteer hour = 10 meals

Our goal as a District is to provide 200,000 meals for Missourians facing hunger. Use this link (https://forms.gle/r4VKvBEXBrGw4Rxh7) to log the estimated meals provided during the annual hunger drive. The data provided will help track our progress. It is incumbent on each club to track their volunteer activity through the portal established at Rotary Club Central using the word "Hunger" in the title of the project, where the 4-Way Test will act as a guide upon which reporting is based. **Also, remember to share your success on Rotary Showcase.**
