Missouri Rotarians Attend Leadership Institute

Rotarians from three Rotary districts in Missouri recently had the opportunity to hear the first female from the United States ever selected to be Rotary International President speak at a training conference for Rotary leaders in Springfield.

Nearly 300 Rotarians and guests attended the Show Me Rotary Leadership Institute March 22-23 at the University Plaza Hotel. Dr. Stephanie Urchick, the incoming president of Rotary International, was the keynote speaker during the banquet.

working cooperatively, the institute is in its 44th year of providing training for future Rotary Club presidents and club leaders in Missouri. This cooperation makes it possible to attract senior Rotary leaders from around the nation and world.


During the institute, Rotarians received training on topics such

as membership, The Rotary Foundation and public image. Featured speakers, in addition to Urchick, were Michael Angelo Caruso, a communication expert from Rochester, Michigan; Beth Stubbs of Maryville,

Urchick will lead Rotary International in 2024–25, officially assuming office July 1. She has chosen "The Magic of Rotary" as her theme for the year, and her keynote address elaborated on that theme.

A member of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, Urchick has been an RI director and Rotary Foundation trustee. She has served RI in numerous capacities, including as training leader, regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, and RI president's representative. In addition, she was a representative and member-at-large to three sessions of the Council on Legislation.

She has also served as chair of the Rotary Strategic Planning Committee and The Rotary Foundation's Centennial Celebration Committee, as well as a member of various Rotary committees, including the Election Review Committee and Operational Review Committee.

Urchick has participated in a variety of international service projects, including National Immunization Days in India and Nigeria. In Vietnam, she worked with clubs to help build a primary school and traveled to the Dominican Republic to install water filters.

A student of several Slavic languages, she has mentored new Rotary members in Ukraine and coordinated a Rotary

Foundation grant for a mammography equipment and a biopsy unit for a hospital in Poland. Currently, she is helping to partner clubs and districts in the U.S. with Rotary clubs in Albania, Kosovo, and Ukraine for humanitarian and educational services.

Missouri has more than 150 Rotary clubs and approximately 6,000 members statewide. As president of Rotary International, Urchick will lead a worldwide organization comprising 1.4 million Rotarians in 46,000 clubs in more than 200 countries.

Fulton Rotary Provides Kids Shoes to Public Schools

Designer shoes are an accessory for many women but for children, good, basic shoes are a necessity. Through a partnership with Fulton Public Schools, the Rotary Club of Fulton is providing new shoes for children in need in the community.

In prior years, shoes have been distributed at Serve, Inc.'s Back-to-School event in the summer. However, this year the organization that had provided them in the past was unable to do so and youngsters went without new shoes to start the school year.

Fulton Rotary decided to rectify the situation, so Rotarians applied for a grant from Veterans United Foundation and



received \$15,000 to purchase new winter coats and shoes for youngsters in Callaway County. The coats were distributed through Serve's Adopt-a-Family event in December. The shoes have been placed in a "shoe closet" at Bartley Elementary School for distribution to all district schools.

"Rotary is thrilled that the Veteran's United Foundation saw the importance of keeping kids warm this year by allowing us to steward this coat and shoes grant for Fulton," Stephanie Rademan, president of the Rotary Club of Fulton, said. "The School Counselors are now able to immediately meet the need for children whose feet are not being protected and this shoe closet will help children for many years to come. We are proud to be a part of solving this issue in our community."

The shoes were purchased from Shoes from the Heart, a non-profit based in Macon, Mo. The organization believes in making a difference in lives "by simply providing a basic need that we cannot live without—shoes." Founded in 2012, Shoes from the Heart has expanded to every county in Missouri and 21 other states. The grant from Veterans United Foundation provided more than 700 pairs

of new tennis shoes for the shoes closet in Fulton.

"New shoes last longer, and as a gift to a child with few possessions, they communicate volumes about his or her inherent worth," Rademan said. For many families, new shoes are a luxury they cannot afford. New shoes are important because they put children on a path to health, education, hope and opportunity.

Shoes protect against disease and infection and lower barriers to school attendance. Studies show that children who are healthy are more likely to be successful in school and have higher attendance, increasing

their chances of obtaining an education and rising out of poverty. New shoes provide hope for children that someone cares about them and loves them unconditionally.

"Through this partnership with local and regional organizations, Fulton Public Schools is excited to create this shoe closet space to ensure students who need shoes have access to shoes," Daniel Rector, director of student services for Fulton Public Schools, said.


