# Dynamic Speakers: Learn Who They Are



#### Stephanie A. Urchick

The incoming president (2024-25) of Rotary International, Stephanie Urchick, will be the featured speaker at Friday evening's dinner. A Rotary member since 1991, she is a member of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania.

Stephanie has been an RI director and Rotary Foundation trustee. She has served RI in numerous capacities, including as training leader, regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, and RI president's representative. In addition, Stephanie was a representative and member-at-large to three sessions of the Council on Legislation.

She has also served as chair of the Rotary Strategic Planning Committee and The Rotary Foundation's Centennial Celebration Committee, as well as a member of various Rotary committees, including the Election Review Committee and Operational Review Committee.

Stephanie has participated in a variety of international service projects, including National Immunization Days in India and Nigeria. In Vietnam, she worked with clubs to help build a primary school and traveled to the Dominican Republic to install water filters. A student of several Slavic languages, she has mentored new Rotary members in Ukraine and coordinated a Rotary Foundation grant for a mammography equipment and a biopsy unit for a hospital in Poland. Currently, Stephanie is helping to partner clubs and districts in the U.S. with Rotary clubs in Albania, Kosovo, and Ukraine for humanitarian and educational services.

Her professional background is in the higher education, consulting, and entertainment industries. She received her doctorate degree in Leadership Studies from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and has been recognized and awarded by The Rotary Foundation and numerous community and international organizations.

#### **Michael Angelo Caruso**

Friday morning's speaker, Michael Angelo Caruso, teaches people how to be better speakers and presenters so they can help more people and amp up their careers. He utilizes his unique background in the technology sector and a separate career in the entertainment business to deliver keynote speeches that feel like a combination of your best teacher and your favorite comedian.

Michael delivers about 70 presentations and keynote speeches a year. He has spoken on six continents and in 49 of the 50 states. He can make anyone a better communicator and regularly demonstrates his effective communication strategies by helping audience members improve during *his* presentation.

He is founder and president of Edison House, an international consulting firm specializing in corporate and personal improvement. Edison House clients include Hallmark, Bank of America, Verizon Wireless, Rayovac, Citgo, Nissan and the United States Navy. Michael has authored <u>Work Hacks</u> and the audiobook, *Dear Michael Angelo -- A Father's Life Letters to His Son*. He also has a highly rated online speaker coaching masterclass titled, *Present Like a Pro*.

Michael loves giving back. He served as president of the Rotary Club of Troy, Michigan (2013-14), Governor for District 6380 (2016-17), Public Image Coordinator for Zone 28 and 32 (2019-21), and is currently Lead Trainer for Great Lakes Rotary PETS. His popular seminar fundraiser has raised over a quarter of a million dollars for Rotary Clubs all over North America.

#### **Beth Stubbs**



Beth Stubbs, Rotary International Director for Zones 30 and 31, will be Friday's luncheon speaker. She first started frequenting Rotary club meetings at age 8 with her father and joined the Rotary Club of Maryville, Tennessee, in 1991.

Beth served her district in several capacities including as chair of its finance, Foundation, and leadership development and education committees. Stubbs has attended 21 international conventions, traveled to New York City for UN Day for

Rotary, served in a National Immunization Day in India, traveled to Mexico for club partnership

projects, and attended various Zone meetings around the country. She and her husband, Tony, support The Rotary Foundation as Arch Klumph Society members.

Beth is a certified public accountant (CPA) who earned her degree at Plymouth State College. After working as a CPA at a Maryville firm, she set up her own private practice in 1994.

She has served on the boards of local nonprofits including at Michael Dunn Center, which helps individuals with developmental disabilities and at Asbury Place, a regional retirement community organization. She also served in officer positions in Toastmasters International and is active on several committees at her church. In her spare time, she enjoys reading, traveling, and attending football and basketball games at the University of Tennessee.

#### **Sigrid Solomon**

Sigrid Solomon an independent diversity consultant and a frequent presenter at conferences on the topic of diversity leadership. She will speak during Saturday's lunch. Sigrid has more than 30 years of higher education experience and serves as the VP, Chief Student Affairs Officer and Dean of Students at Wilmington College in Ohio.

She holds a B.S. in Industrial and Labor Relations from Cornell University, an M.Ed. from East Carolina University and is currently working on her Doctorate through

Ashland University.

Her passion and experience for community affairs have led to her becoming heavily involved in the local community and she was recognized in 2016 as one of the Outstanding Women of Clinton County. A Rotarian since 2003, she has served in a variety of capacities at the local, district, and zone levels. She served as president of two Rotary Clubs and as District Governor of Rotary District 6670 in 2019-20.

Sigrid was a member of the 2021-22 RI Director Nominating Committee for Zone 30. She also served as one of the 2022 International Assembly Training Leaders. For Zones 30/31, she has served as cochair of the Diversity Advisory Circle, DGN lead trainer and DGE lead trainer. Sigrid is currently the chair of the District 6670 PDG Council and DEI chair.



#### **Ashley Dawn**

Our entertainment during Friday evening's dinner will be Ashley Dawn, who was Branson's Terry Music Female Vocalist of 2022. She is a seasoned Nashville recording artist with country, bluegrass and southern gospel roots. who channels the music of Reba, Dolly, Miranda Lambert, Shania, the Judds, etc.

She landed a Nashville record deal at the age of 17 and toured with her brother and sister in the southern gospel trio, the Praters, charting on the top 100. Together, the trio performed over 200 concerts per year across the

country.

She was later contracted as the lead vocalist for the 135th Army Band, Aftershock, where she toured for two years, performing at military balls and various theme parks. In Fall of 2023 she joined Nashville recording artist, Shane Vancamp, to form the duo, Outer Limits, after performing together for four years on the Branson's Famous Baldknobbers show.
