April is Maternal and Child Health Month

Maternal and child health is one of Rotary International's six areas of focus.

In the Philipines, the Rotary Clubs of San Pedro South New Generation, West Bay, Los Banos, Silangang San Pablor and Batangeas Mid-West joined to gether for the *Healthy Mother for Healthy Babies* project. The clubs conducted a seminar, sharing the benefits of breastfeeding and how mothers can best protect and care for themselves while they are nursing their babies. Diapers, hand towels and soaps were distributed to mothers that attended.





In a very high poverty area in southern West Virginia, at the center of the opioid crisis, the Rotary Club of Princeton, West Virgina is addressing these factors that contribute to a very high rate of domestic violence and the need for services with their *Mardi Bras for a Cause* project. Battered women in shelters often receive donations of clothes or coats, but rarely receive personal care items or underwear. The club wanted to do a fun project that might attract new, like-minded members. The signature event was a relaxed social time with Mardi Gras-style beads, music and plenty of refreshments. They had over 100 non-Rotarians attend this first-

ever event in the two hour drop-in time frame.

The Rotary Club of Bweyogerere-Namboole, Uganda, sponsors a **monthly dental project**. They attract an average of 35 mothers and children every month. The activity was organized to commemorate the charter of the Rotary Club of Bweyogere Central. *(right)*

On 27 January, more than 30 Surfers Unite Rotarian Fellowship (SURF) members gathered to support the Boys to Men Mentoring Foundation with a **1 Wave Challenge and 5K Beach Run**. Rotarians from several clubs, Rotaractors from University of California San Diego, and Interactors from James Madison and University City high schools took part in an attempt to set a world record by exceeding 110 surfers on the same wave at the same time. Brett came to Louisiana after the devastating flood of August 2016 to help gut and rebuild homes. He also helped us to raise over \$50,000 for Louisiana flood survivors in the Baton Rouge area.

The assessment will determine a community's strengths, weaknesses, needs and assets to assure the project is effective and sustainable in the community where the project will be undertaken. The *Louisiana Hills and Hollows Bicycle Tour* is coming up on Saturday, May 29 at the West Feliciana Sports Park located at 10226 West Feliciana Parkway in St. Francisville.

This fully-supported cycling event offers bicyclists of all ability levels a wide variety of marked routes through Louisiana's premiere hill country, including 36, 45 and 65 mile routes.

Come and experience the back roads of scenic West Feliciana Parish as you pedal your way under the canopies of century-old live oaks, navigate its big hills and deep hollows, leisurely steer your way past beautiful pastoral scenes and traverse the sandy creeks over low-



water bridges. The tours will start and end at the magnificent West Feliciana Sports Park, which is also home to "The Beast", Louisiana's foremost 6.5 mile off-road biking trail.

The tour is sponsored by the Rotary Club of St. Francisville and the proceeds of this charitable event will serve to benefit our organization and its many service endeavors within the community.

The entry fee is \$40 per rider and includes a customized event t-shirt, water bottle, and a delicious, post-ride meal. Late registration is \$50 after May 12th. To make the event more enjoyable, there will be ample rest stops and restrooms along the routes and SAG Wagons and Patrol Vehicles, as well as a Law Enforcement and EMS presence for traffic control and medical assistance.

Be advised that this tour is not a race, but rather for personal enjoyment and satisfaction in knowing that you helped a good cause while having a lot of fun with family and friends.

SNELL or ANSI approved helmets are required for all participants, and all entrants must be at least 12 years of age. Participants under the age of 18 will require the written consent of their Parent(s) or Legal Guardian.

Day-of-event registration will begin at 7:00 am at The West Feliciana Sports Park, 10226 West Feliciana Parkway, located on the northern edge of St. Francisville, via U.S. Highway 61. The tours will commence as follows: 65 mile – 8:00 am; 45 mile – 8:30 am; 36 mile – 9:00 am



Polio this week as of 20 March 2018

<u>Afghanistan</u>: Two new cases of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) were confirmed this week. One case occurred in Gaziabad district, Kunar province, with onset of paralysis on 14 February, and the other case occurred in Shawalikot district, Kandahar province, with onset of paralysis on 19 February. This will raise the total number of officially reported WPV1 cases in Afghanistan in 2018 to five.

<u>Central Africa</u>: One new case of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) was reported this week in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). The case was reported in Mulongo district, Haut Lomami province, with onset of paralysis on 31 January. This raises the total number of officially reported cVDPV2 cases in the DRC in 2018 to three.

<u>Horn of Africa</u>: An advance notification of one new circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) positive environmental sample in Somalia has been received, collected on 22 February from Hodan district, Banadir province. Before this most recent advance notification, three cVDPV2s were isolated from two environmental samples collected in Hamarweyn district, Banadir province (Mogadishu), Somalia, one on 4 January, and one on 11 January 2018. These latest isolates are genetically linked to previously isolated VDPV2s from 2017, collected on 22 October and 2 November from environmental samples collected from Waberi district, Banadir province. In total, four environmental samples (with seven unique virus sequences) positive for cVDPV2 were collected in Somalia between October 2017, and January 2018.
