Environmental Sustainability Task Force 2022-23 Report

In October 2022, a zoom meeting was held with Kate Florek (Wausau) and Trey Foerster (Waupaca), co-chairs, with Heather Huebner (Greater Portage County) and Erica Huss (Marquette).

So far, the Task Force has drafted a charter, conducted a survey of District clubs, created a project possibility list, heard of the progress of the Michigan UP Nature Conservancy connection, and also heard about the Tree Promise with the Girl Scouts.

Goals were outlined:

 Better capture what District is already doing with highway cleanup, tree plantings, and pollinator plantings.

- (2) Provide project guides/tool kits to clubs and engage non-Rotarians in projects/programs.
- (3) Provide a speakers list to clubs.
- (4) Created a District environment email for the Task Force.
- (5) Request quarterly reporting by clubs of what projects/programs they did, collect for distribution on District Facebook page.
- (6) Re-engage former committee members.

On Feb. 7, 2023, Trey and Kate met via Zoom and created a plan of action for the third and fourth quarters.

- (1) Create a "regular" newsletter once a quarter to send out to clubs.
- (2) Ask clubs to give us info to share with other clubs.
- (3) Update clubs about things that are going on.
- (4) Work with clubs on environmentrelated grants.
- (5) Create an annual challenge for clubs.
- (6) Contact clubs and inform them of the new direction of the Task Force and invite each club to let the Task Force know what they've been doing.

Progress on goals has bene limited. Clubs responding to the survey totaled 11: Clintonville, Greater Portage County, Iron Mountain-Kingsford, Lakeland, Marquette, Marquette West, New London, Rhinelander, Wakefield-Bessemer, Waupaca, and Wausau. All these clubs have environmental projects especially highway and trail pickup.

A speakers list has been created but not distributed.

The lack of success of the Task Force has been the lack of interest by clubs to participate on the District level. Perhaps a quarterly emailed newsletter may provide the necessary resource for clubs so they may be informed of environment-related events and successes of clubs in the District.

The Task Force needs to recalibrate for the 2023-24 year.





Earth Week Tap Talk: Land Conservation in Central Wisconsin Central Waters Brewing Company





Tree Planting with Girl Scouts

One of the sessions was devoted to District's commitment to Empowerment of Girls and Young Women through Grants. Here is a genteel reminder to avail of such an opportunity to Grow Rotary Through Service. Hope you will rise up to the occasion!

Background

Rotary District 6220 has identified "Grow Rotary Through Service" as its theme to encourage collaboration between our Clubs and other service organizations in addressing the needs of our communities. The collaboration between our District and the Girl Scouts of the Northern Great Lakes. launched in 2022 has identified Empowerment of Girls and Young Women as its focus. One the four major initiatives identified by the Task Force for collaboration is the Girl Scouts Tree Promise that seeks to plant 6 million trees by the year 2026. To protect and honor new and existing trees is entirely consistent with the Rotary International focus on Protecting the Environment. To assist clubs in the addressing of our common cause, Rotary District 6220 offered 10 matching grants of \$500 each. Three clubs were successful during the first round. Several clubs expressed a need to extend the timelines to include a Fall effort to plant trees. This announcement is for 6-7 remaining \$500 matching grants with new dates the Empowerment of Girls and Young Women Grants. Empowerment of Girls and Young Women Grants 2023. The focus of this year's Empowerment Grants will be centered around Tree Promise. These matching grants of \$500 each to specifically to assist clubs collaborate with their local Girl Scout troops, to plant trees in local communities where there is a pressing need or an opportunity to conserve the environment. For this collaboration to be successful, we need active involvement Rotarians to work with other supportive organizations such as the Department of Natural Resources, Parks and Recreation and such to determine the community need, sourcing the plants/trees and planting and caring for the trees.

Proposals should clearly indicate any active, hands-on participation by Rotarians and their families, Rotaractors/Interactors/RYE Students where possible. **Project Completion Date: All tree planting under this grant must be**

completed no later than November 7, 2023. Some important dates to note: - Deadline for submitting proposals: May 15, 2023 - Grant Decisions: May 25, 2023 - Project completion date: November 1, 2023 - Project Reports are due: November 7, 2023.Please complete the attached grant application form and mail it to Lisa VanderKelen at

Biodiversity beats climate change as talking point

The topic of biodiversity may sound just as amorphous as ESG. But compared with climate change, it may be an easier subject to broach with US investors who lean Republican.

Biodiversity refers to <u>forests</u>, oceans and other ecosystems, as well as efforts to protect them. It's an area that isn't politically fraught like subjects such as "net zero," said John Hoeppner, who runs US stewardship and sustainable investments at Legal & General Investment Management America.

"Using phrases related to carbon emissions instantly becomes a highly political

conversation in a Republican state," he said. Yet conversations related to deforestation, water and land use are more unifying. "Habitat conservation has support across the political spectrum," he said.

Biodiversity involves conservation and restoration of natural habitats, as well as promoting sustainable practices. And since it includes more tangible topics like land and water rather than net-zero goals that are far off in the future, it's easier for people to grasp, Hoeppner said.

Money managers have started biodiversity strategies to invest in companies that they say will help minimize harm to natural habitats.

A <u>survey conducted</u> in March by Penn State University and political consulting group Rokk Solutions found that most Republican and Democratic voters say corporate environmental action is relevant to their financial futures. More than 55% of GOP voters agreed that efforts such as land and water conservation, waste management and biodiversity were germane to the future finances. For net-zero goals, support in the ESG investing survey slumped to 42%.
