A few weeks after organization, it was decided to publish a weekly bulletin, and Hal Dodge was chosen to be the "Editarian".

The happy location of Augusta Rotary, ten miles from Battle Creek and less than fifteen from Kalamazoo and only a few miles from Climax, makes this Club a mecca for those Rotarians desiring to make up attendance. Up to December 31, 1956, visitors have been noted as follows:

WEETING PLACES: When the Augusta Rotary was organized, meetings were held in the dining room of the Augusta Hotel, Ford Campbell, proprietor. Upon the completion of Ford's new eating place, on the east side of the mill-stream, in the month of May 1955, Rotary went to the new building and since then, has met in a very comfortable and well-adapted room in the basement of Ford's Place. It is a matter of record that one of the attractions which this Club has for visitors, is the exceptionally good meals served each week by Ford.

### SERVICES RENDERED BY THE CLUB:

"Service Above Self" has been the ideal of Rotary from its very inception fifty years ago, and Augusta Rotary has made a real record in that respect. Among the notable services rendered have been the following:

On December 9, 1954, "Hap" Hazard made the suggestion that a "Youth Club" be formed. In the following February, the suggestion found fruition and such a club was organized, meeting

> on Wednesday evenings at the VFW hall. Supervising the club was Gar Haines, assisted by other Rotarians and parents of some of the youths belonging. Attendance ran close to fifty on the average, and the club proved to be very popular with the youths of High School age. Later a community organization was set up, sparked again by Rotarians and their wives. Meetings were held in the empty Hotel dining room, given free for that use by Ford Campbell. This movement became extremely popular and well patronized and rendered a real service to the youths of the community and surrounding territory. In January of 1955, the Rotary Club purchased a TV set for Ray Howell, a handicapped man of the community. In addition to the above, the Club purchased baseballs for the local youth team, and sent a scout to camp for a week, as well as contributing \$100 toward a new building at Camp Ben Johnston.

While a member, Click Smith, was confined to the Borgess
Hospital, Kalamazoo. The Club, on March 17, 1955, recorded
the meeting and sent the tape to Click for his enjoyment.
During Michigan Week, both years of the Club's life, Rotary
has participated in the reception and dinner given for
visiting mayors from other communities.

#### PROGRAI'S

One of the important factors in keeping interest in Rotary, is that of informative and vital programs. During the administration of T. Ben Johnston, Spencer Owens acted as General Program Chairman. The first six months, he provided for each weekly program. After that, he appointed two members to be responsible for a program each meeting for one month. Beginning July 1st, Joe Nemeth took over as General Program Chairman, following the same practice of two members being responsible for each month.

In the period covered, a great variety of programs were provided, some of which are detailed herewith:

Talks on various medical problems and health matters by such experts as Mrs. Marjorie Luna of Kalamazoo on "Cancer Research"; Dr. French, Kalamazoo County Health officer; Dr. William Perdew of Bronson Hospital, Kalamazoo; Dr. Stryker, Kalamazoo; two addresses by Leslie Engstrom, a member of Albion College faculty; two by William Harton, also of Albion; Probate Judge Anderson, Kalamazoo, on Juvenile Delinquency; Dean Murray of Battle Creek, twice, with pictures taken on his hunting trips into the wilds. Don Ebinger, of Climax. W. C. Buchanan, of East Lansing. William Smith, of Battle Creek, on "Stamp Collecting". J. E. Wilbur, Michigan State Highway Department. Ernest Alm, with Navy pictures. Kellogg Research Station. These men and themes indicate the wide
and varied programs that have been of value to the whole membership.
On November 3, 1955, the Club celebrated its birthday anniversary,
having as speaker District Governor, George Dean.

Other program occasions of note have been two Ladies' Night steak-roasts, one at T. Ben Johnston Camp, and one at the Kellogg Bird Sanctuary. Other Ladies' Nights also have been held, with rich fellowship and good programs. Two Christmas parties for children have been staged during the Christmas vacation period for the two years the Club has been functioning, the entertainment both times being Jack Ricketts, Nagician.

### OTHER ITELS OF INTEREST

The Club has held two attendance contests with the Climax Club, stimulating 100% attendance in one case, and a very close approach to it in the other. Up to June 23, 1955, the following members held 100% attendance records:

On December 20, 1955, Hap Hazard reported expenditures by the Club to the amount of \$678.83, of which \$363.44 were for "service above self" projects, a record which speaks for itself.
