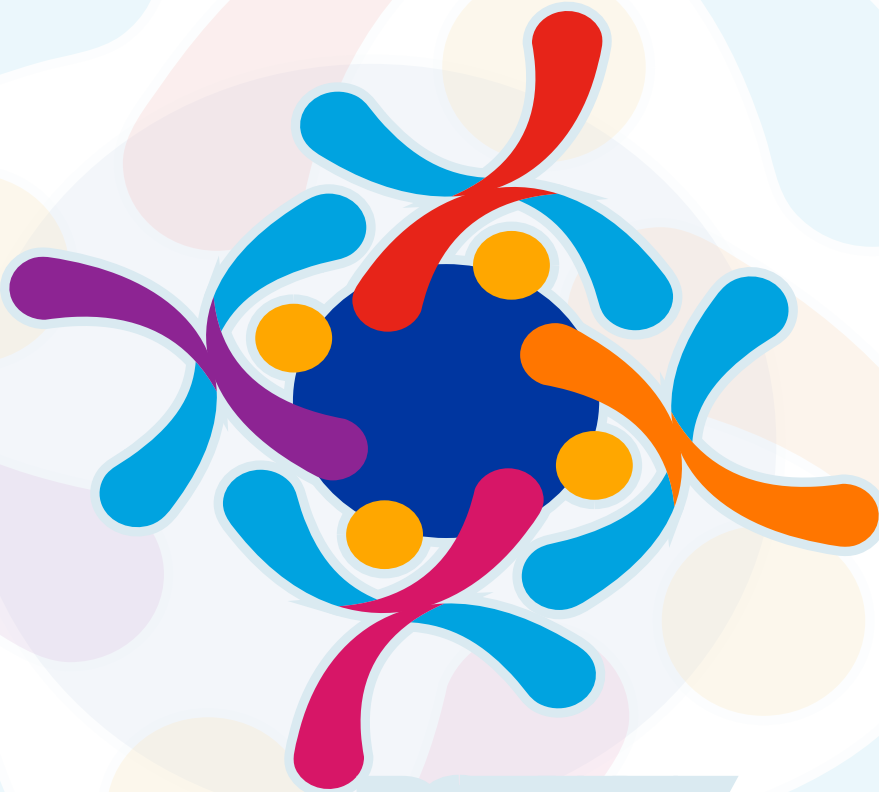

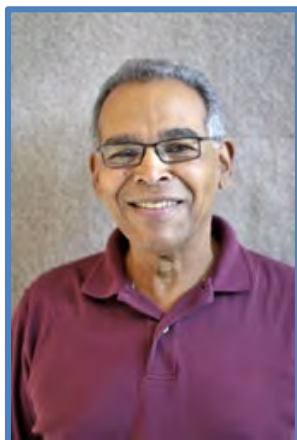

Marie Stech is an entrepreneur, a community leader, and an outstanding Rotarian, but her passion is gardening. She grew up on Gull Lake with four brothers in a family of builders. In 1984 she carved out a niche in the construction industry by forming Construction Labor Services, which provides union construction personnel (carpenters, electricians, and others in the skilled trades) to contractors. Her daughter, Mikel, also a Rotarian, now runs the business.

A Rotarian since 2002, Marie has wasted no time in getting involved in Rotary and its service projects. Fundraising came naturally. She served as business chair for the Gull Lake Community Schools “Pathway of Pride” project in 2004. The goal was to create a new entrance and concession stand at the outdoor sports facilities at the high school. Marie secured significant contributions through the sale of bricks inscribed with the names of community donors. With the support of her fellow Rotarians, an additional \$7,500 was raised from club members and a Rotary District grant.

In 2006 Marie initiated a Rotary Club Scholarship Program, which has provided 28 scholarships totaling more than \$23,000. The following year Marie was elected President, becoming the third woman to lead the Rotary Club of Gull Lake Area. Being a strong supporter of the Richland Area Community Center, she promoted and completed a number of projects at RACC with the financial support of Rotary and the help of aspiring Eagle Scouts. The Boy Scouts built a gazebo and created walking trails and trail markers. Her fundraising skills have helped our club with the 4th of July Raffle, the Spaghetti Dinner, the Richland Village Hall renovation project, and the sale of District Foundation raffle tickets. She has also given generously to the Rotary Foundation.

Now retired, Marie spend hours cultivating her beautiful gardens, nurturing her Hostas, and collecting miniature plants of all kinds. She is a “giver”, living out our motto of “*Service Above Self*”.

Terri Papiersky – “Dependable Terri”

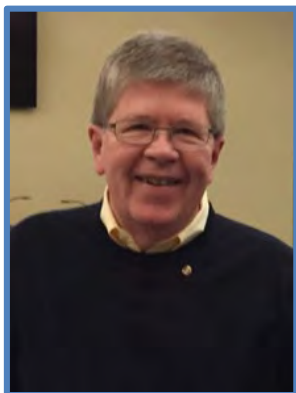

Prudence Barrett Nelson was born in Newberry, Michigan but spent most of her childhood in Spain. She moved back to Michigan her senior year of high school and graduated from St. Ignace High School. She went to Taylor University for 1.5 years and then to Michigan State for 1.5 years to earn her Bachelor's Degree in Human Nutrition. She started medical school at State at the age of 20. She was working on a Masters in Nutrition as well but that was interrupted by pregnancy. She Interned at Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak. Then it was back to State where she finished her residency in Pediatrics. She moved to St. Joseph in 1984 to join Drs. Feeley and Skinner pediatric practice. When they retired, David Driscoll joined her. While working she earned a Master's in Public Health (Preventive Medicine) in 2005 from the Medical College of Wisconsin. She returned to school to obtain a Post-Graduate Diploma in Infectious Disease in 2016 from the University of London – London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. She simultaneously completed the Global Health/Tropical Medicine Course at the University of Minnesota becoming certified in Tropical Medicine in 2016.

Prudy has worked in Disaster Response starting in 1990, doing one or two trips per year primarily through Medical Teams International of Portland, OR, and International Medical Care. She has served as a physician in Cambodia, Indonesia, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, India, Pakistan, Darfur, Liberia, Rwanda, Paraguay and Ecuador, including several trips to South Sudan, Uganda and the Dominican Republic. Early in her career, she served as the medical director of a clinic in Haiti for a year and a half. Prudy also led a group of 25 medical students and residents to the Himalayas where they camped for a month during which she taught a class on “Resource-Poor Medicine” while providing care to villagers and Buddhist Monasteries. She was a charter member of the US Surgeon General's Federal Disaster Response Cadre which was closely involved with the H1N1 Influenza epidemic of 2009. Prudy joined Rotary in 2013 and is a member of the Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers. Her areas of expertise are Disease Prevention and Maternal/Child Health. She helps with Global Grant evaluations and has completed Global Grant project evaluations in Bolivia, Argentina, Belize, Grenada and Mexico. She was on the Surgeon General Disaster Response Team during H1N1.



Rotary Club of Three Rivers

Pattie Bender – “Community Builder”

Pattie Bender served in St. Joseph County government for 45 years—the last 24 years as county clerk—but her influence extended far beyond the courthouse walls into the community. Most relevant to the Rotary Club of Three Rivers, she has been secretary for 14 years, making sure everything runs smoothly and according to proper procedure. She is the longest-tenured woman in our club, with 25 years of perfect attendance. She was its first woman president and is a two-time Paul Harris recipient. A resident of Centreville and proud Bulldog alumna, she continues to build up that community as program manager of its Downtown Development Authority. She plays a key role as clerk of session at First Presbyterian Church of Three Rivers/Centreville, where she is a valuable resource for administrative knowledge. Her other involvement includes the Three Rivers Area Chamber of Commerce, the Centreville Lions Club, the St. Joseph County United Way, the St. Joseph County Grange Fair, and the St. Joseph County Republican Party.
