We currently have two Rotaract Clubs in our district: one in Kalamazoo, and the other on the Michigan State University campus. Plans are also underway to start one or two more Rotaract Clubs in our district. 
Marshall Rotary Club Hosts Good(will) Program!



Human Resources and Vice President, **Art Karr** and **Ellen Sanford**, Director of the new and expanded Goodwill, joined Rotary this week to talk about the wonderful things going on in Marshall. The new larger location 842 West Michigan Avenue now has 1600 square feet, a major difference from the old crowded store at the plaza. It has spread out for individual displays and shopper friendly signs to guide shoppers thru the store. The register is in front. The drop off is at the side of the building allowing customers to roll up and hand off donations.

Donations are now processed right in the store rather than going to a distribution center in Charlotte. 200 items are put on display daily.

The Grand Opening welcomed 1300 people on the first day. Director Sanford has a staff of 19 people which is constantly changing due to the philosophy of "job training for job placement". The store now has space for training in the building. CHANGING LIVES THRU THE POWER OF WORK is the focus of Goodwill that offers classes in resume writing, handling finances, managing money and more. 


ROTARY DISTRICT PUBLIC IMAGE

Rotarians Host Joint Meeting to Recognize Lincoln's 209th Birthday

Rotarians from the Cereal City Sunrise and Battle Creek Rotary Clubs, met in a joint meeting on Abraham Lincoln's 209th Birthday and heard a lecture on the life of Lincoln by historian and researcher, Ann Sheadel.

The meeting took place at the Battle Creek Community Foundation's Hampton Building which houses the "A.Lincoln" exhibit, a portrait of Lincoln made entirely of pennies. The portrait was the Grand Winner of ArtPrize 9 which takes place each year in Grand Rap-

ids, Michigan and involves hundreds of artists in a public judging over the course of two weeks.

A.Lincoln was created by Battle Creek artist Richard Schlatter using a variety of pennies in different conditions. Lincoln's shirt is made entirely of steel pennies from the World

War II era. The work of art has been on public

display in Battle Creek since the conclusion of ArtPrize last fall.

Club presidents Troy Wensauer of the Cereal City Sunrise Club and Kathy Gallagher of the Battle Creek Rotary Club welcomed members from both clubs which include many of Battle Creek's community leaders.

Sheadel gave a presentation on Lincoln with an emphasis of his opinions on slavery and the challenges he faced dealing with that issue. She also read many of Lincoln's famous words and described Lincoln as brilliant speaker and orator who never spoke without being very prepared.

The exhibit is housed at the Battle Creek Community Foundation, 32 West Michigan Avenue in Battle Creek and is open for viewing Monday-Saturday from 10 a.m to 2 p.m. and Sunday from 12 p.m. to 2 p.m. Admission is free.
