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October: Economic & Community Development Month

It's hard to believe that autumn is here and we are already through the first quarter of the 2020-2021 Rotary year. Time flies when you're focused on Service Above Self!

October is traditionally Rotary's Economic and Community Development Month, which has taken on new meaning and focus amidst the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. In addition to finding new ways to implement longstanding service projects in our hometowns and supporting projects abroad, Rotarians find ourselves in the position of having to step up in a big way to help our neighbors, communities, and local businesses weather the pandemic storm. Let me tell you: it's been inspiring to see the multitude of ways in which District 6360 Rotary clubs have pulled together to get this critical work done despite (and because of) the extraordinary circumstances of this moment. As our Rotary International President Nominee Jennifer Jones has said repeatedly of late: the world needs Rotary now more than ever before.

October also means World Polio Day (10/24). While we've made incredible progress in our quest to eradicate polio, the final steps may well be the most difficult. We can't afford to let up now. I hope that many of you will join me in making an additional contribution to PolioPlus this month. I hope that you'll take advantage of the opportunity to attend (virtually) the "Polio Eradication in 2020" panel with John Germ, Mike McGovern, Aruna Koushik, and Jennifer Jones on the evening of October 6. And, I look forward to hearing more about the success of the many club-level World Polio Day events that will be taking place this month.

Finally, October means that the weather is cooling and many clubs have questions and concerns about meeting logistics going forward. Those conversations have been immeasurably complicated by recent legal developments related to Michigan's response to the novel coronavirus and the emerging patchwork of local restrictions that is emerging in place of a statewide standard. The District's leadership is monitoring the situation closely and will be providing additional guidance in the days to come. For now, Rotarians should remember the principles that have been adopted by the RI Board of Directors related to COVID-19:

- The health and safety of all participants in Rotary programs, meetings, and events is of paramount importance.
- No in-person meeting or event shall be mandatory for any Rotary participant who may feel uncomfortable attending because of the pandemic.
- All conveners and organizers of Rotary meetings are strongly encouraged to consider all health concerns in deciding whether to hold in-person meetings.
- While not required, Rotary International recommends that districts and Rotary and Rotaract clubs meet virtually.

These are challenging circumstances and difficult decisions. As we move forward into the winter months, in addition to the aforementioned principles, our decision-making should be guided by the Four Way Test and a commitment to prioritizing and protecting the health of our members and the reputation of our organization. As always, should you need support of any kind, please don't hesitate to contact me or our District team. Nominations Now Accepted for District Governor Nominee (Rotary Year 2023-2024)

Nominations are now being accepted from clubs of people interested in and willing to

serve as District 6360 Governor for the Rotary year 2023-2024. Deadline for nominations to be received from clubs is **Friday, November 6, 2020.**

Qualifications for serving as District Governor are as follows:

- The person must be a member in good standing of a functioning club in District 6360, and the integrity of the classification of membership must be without question.
- The person must have served as a Club President.
- The person must demonstrate willingness, commitment, and ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the office of governor, as well as knowledge of the duties and responsibilities of the office of governor.
- The person must have been a member of a Rotary club for at least seven (7) years *at the time of taking office as governor.*

The official "District Governor Nominee Nomination Form" must be used, and a Resolution by the club must also accompany the completed form. The form is available from the District Office. 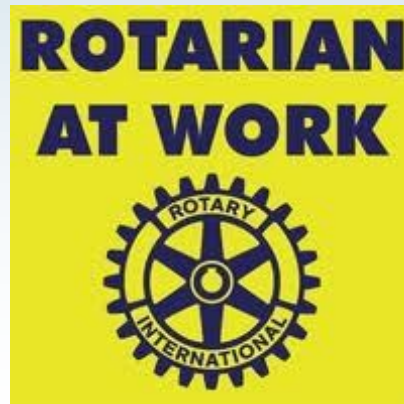

NEW PROJECT “RE-CONNECT” LAUNCHES!

Welcome to Fall, 2020! It’s back to school (either virtually or in-person), the weather is beginning to change, and the trees are starting to change into their beautiful colors. It’s time for us to focus on club membership. How are we going to do that during this pandemic??

First, let’s focus on club membership in terms of engagement for retention. Since the pandemic hit in March, clubs have felt an impact in many ways. Now is the time to rise up, dust ourselves off, re-group, and get going again! **Project Re-Connect aims at connecting with each Rotarian in your club by mail, phone, in-person, or online by November 30, 2020.** Each Rotary Club board initiates a plan to connect with each member in their club by November 30, 2020.

Start with using your attendance information to find out who is NOT attending meetings and/or projects. Do you know why they are not attending? Let each person know you care about them and miss them. Communication is the basis for **Project Re-Connect**. Have a conversation with each member. Find out about their skills, hobbies, interests and passions. What projects would they like to participate on? Are there areas of interest such as environment, education and literacy, economic development, or peace and conflict resolution? What about their family?

Establish a communication plan to determine what you want to communicate with members and how. Club e-newsletters, websites, and social media pages are useful communication tools.

Recognize that different members use different communication tools, and try to offer information using more than one method. Members might enjoy learning about:

- Club information — projects, activities, news, and events
- Club financial reports
- International service opportunities
- Rotary’s online tools and resources (and how members can benefit from them)
- Rotary news highlights

Regularly communicate to your club members about:

- Opportunities to
 - ◊ Take on leadership roles
 - ◊ Attend club assemblies and district-level seminars
 - ◊ Participate in multidistrict meetings
 - ◊ Get involved in club and district projects and activities
- Rotary programs, projects, and activities
- Special Rotary events, including the Rotary International Convention and district conference
- Strategies for attracting new members
- The goals and initiatives of the club and district committees
- Progress toward membership and other goals
- Awards and recognition programs
- Sponsorship of new Rotary clubs

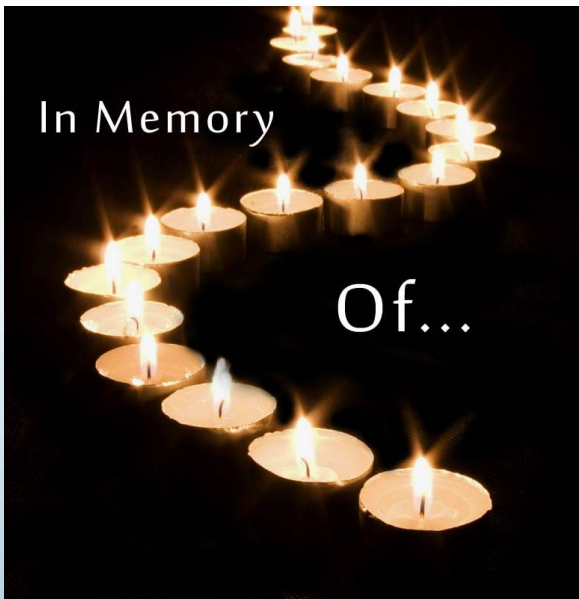

What Rotary has to Offer Young Members

What's life like for people between the ages of 18 and 35 in the Boothbay Region of Maine? Through Rotary, young people take on leadership positions that expand their skills while they serve. **Rotary does more than help during a crisis like COVID-19; it provides experiences that translate into a better future in any career.**

The Rotary Club of Boothbay Harbor created a new membership level to make joining more accessible for those under the age of 35. In addition, generous club members have chosen to pay the first-year membership costs for the first five new members in this category.



We call it the Rule of 35 and it reduces dues by more than 50% for those under the age of 35. It's a commitment by our club to keep growing and learning, and to keep inviting young people to see what skills they can develop and add to their own resumes. It's an invitation to make a difference.

Through Rotary, I have discovered what is possible when a group of like-minded individuals get together to make a difference. It matters not at all that we come in many shapes and sizes, backgrounds, or age-ranges. After a short few years, it's apparent to me that what we have in common is more important than our differences. We believe in *Service Above Self*.

It's more than a motto, it is what compels our club. While we're known for our annual benefit auction (on hiatus, due to the pandemic), our club works year-round to help our local community and communities around the world. We have given out bikes to seasonal and international workers, organized the Soup Bowl Supper and Derby Party fundraisers, run mock job interviews for high school seniors to practice for future careers, and created care packages for veterans, among many other things.

Rotary has also enabled me to become capable, confident and powerful as I worked alongside change-makers. I have gained project management skills that you can only get through organizing and managing a 200 plus person event with three different organizational crews and over 40 donors and vendors. I've become a better, more confident public speaker and learned to use my voice to create change both in Rotary and in my career. I used that voice to convince my fellow members to support our new club membership level for other young professionals like me, the first of its kind in our Rotary district.

At age 25, joining Rotary changed the trajectory of my life. Now 30, I am vice president of our club and have discovered the many ways that I can make a difference. More than that, I joined a family of people who have rich histories, have a lot of love to give, and are committed to their community. Many of them are business leaders with fascinating careers. I learn and laugh with them at our meetings, taking a break from my busy life to connect with people that I would have never had the chance to get to know otherwise. It's the reset button I need after a challenging day. Some of my best friends are twice my age, and my life is twice as rich for having them in it.

Donation Matching Program Still Available!!

Doing Good In The World



Rotarians Doing Good In Their Communities Thanks to The Rotary Foundation!

In recent newsletters, we have featured some of the projects made possible through the district designated funds through The Rotary Foundation. Let's take a look at a last of the projects being completed in 2020-2021!

Special thanks to the Rotarians who support the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund which makes grant funding available each year!

Dynamic Reading

Partnering with Rotary Club of Isabel de Torres, the **St. Joseph Benton Harbor Rotary Club** will use this grant to sponsor a literacy program at Maria Concepcion Gomez School, Dominican Republic. Approximately 1000 students, grades 1-6 will meet with reading facilitators for at least one hour each week. In addition, a reading club for students in 4th to 6th grade will be formed. Two reading fairs will also be hosted. Generally, the program involves reading and supporting activities such as looking up story words in a dictionary or drawing a picture from the story. 15% of the 6th graders are illiterate. This program will raise their reading levels, comprehension, and self-esteem.

Preserving the Communities Health Care Legacy

The **South Haven Rotary** will invest this grant in the construction of a History Wall at the regional health center in their area. The club honors the community's 100 + year health care legacy. Funding will provide construction materials and equipment.



Rotary Scholarship Program

The **South Haven Rotary Club** will provide a scholarship with this grant. This scholarship fund for higher education is focused on students who demonstrate academic achievement, volunteerism in the community and beyond, leadership, financial need and the extent to which the student achieved all of this while exemplifying the principles of the 4 Way Test.

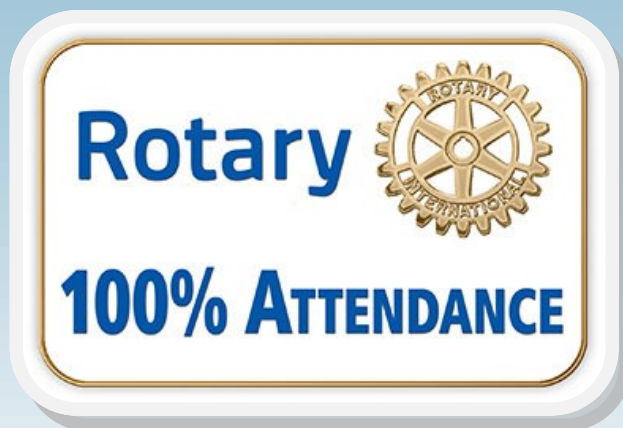
Libertad, Belize School Support

With this grant, the **Three Rivers Rotary Club** will support of the Libertad R.C. School in Libertad Village. This grant will be used to repair the railing that runs around the second floor of the school which has become rusted and very unsafe. Pictures of the existing railing and a quote for the repair were attached to the grant application.

Union City Senior Center

The **Union City Rotary Club** will invest this grant to provide plumbing, new fixtures, flooring and cabinets in the local senior wellness center. In addition, we will support making the bathroom handicap accessible and kitchen repairs. Currently, Union City does not have any options for our residents to have these opportunities without driving to surrounding cities. Isolation leads to depression and our hope is to provide a safe place for our seniors to engage in conversation and socialization.

Rotary Club Attendance: *Explained!*



There has been recent confusion about Club Attendance, reporting requirements, etc. **PDG Ed Foster** explains that the Rotary International (RI) 2019 Manual of Procedure states that ***all clubs submit their attendance to the DG by the 15th of the month for the preceding month.***

One of the issues with attendance that has caused confusion with some clubs, is the new Council on Legislation resolution that states that a “member can submit a makeup for a missed meeting any time the makeup took place for the missed meeting in the same Rotary year.” Most club

bylaws state the only ruling in that a makeup is only good for two weeks before or after a missed meeting. PDG Foster advises a club to take into consideration the number of members in the club with perfect attendance who have long years of perfect attendance. In the Charlotte Rotary Club, they have 14 members with perfect attendance and the club would really upset some of those by using RI’s new rules.

Clubs that want to use the new rule need to amend their bylaws if that is the way they want to keep their attendance. It also needs to be changed in DACdb by going to Club tab and then on the left Column click on Club Setup. Once there, click on the Attendance tab and set the MakeUp Period for 12 months and then Banked Period for 365 days and click Save on the upper right corner.

For our Rotary District, the biggest issue is not attendance percentage, but rather the number of members reported each month. So if a club isn’t even meeting during this pandemic situation, ***they still need to submit their attendance so the membership numbers in the entire District are correct.***

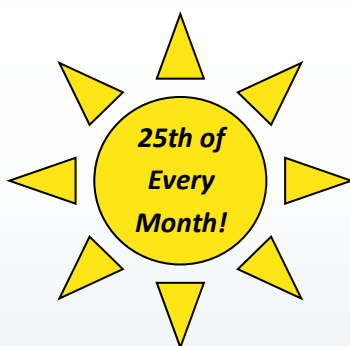
